Local senators named to committees

SALEM (Special) — Senate president Jason Boe (D-Reedsport) followed tradition by announcing committee appointments directly after his election Monday. These local senators were named:

Senator Betty Browne (D-Oakridge) was appointed to the Revenue and Economic Development Committee and will serve on the Judiciary Committee and as vice-chairman of the Consumer and Business Affairs Committee.

Senator Ed Fadeley (D-Eugene) was named chairman of the Education Committee and will also

serve on the Election and Ways and Means Committees.

Senator George Wingard (R-Eugene) was appointed to the environment and Land Use and Human Resource Committees and will serve as vice-chairman of the Revenue Committee.

Other Senate committees are Agricultural and Natural Resources, Rules and Resolutions, Labor, State and Federal Affairs, Local Government and Urban Affairs, and Transportation.

Foreign student enrollment drops

The 1972 enrollment of 776 foreign students at the University represents a drop of 60 students from the previous year's enrollment. The peak of foreign student enrollment was in 1969 with 1,023 students. Since that time the enrollment has shown a decrease of 247.

"The enrollment of foreign students at the University will continue to decline unless some form of state financial aid to foreign students is reinstated," explains Kenneth Ghent, foreign student adviser at the University.

Ghent points out that since October 1971, when the Oregon State Legislature cancelled a partial tuition scholarship program for a limited number of foreign students, enrollment of foreign students at the University has decreased markedly. The reasons for the drop, Ghent believes, have been the increasing cost of tuition and the lack of state government financial support.

"The presence of foreign students on the University campus helps enrich the education of Oregon residents," Ghent said. "They make it possible for Oregon students to learn about life in other countries, and build a more complete world view."

Ghent hopes that the state will reinstate a new program for partial tuition scholarships to foreign students.

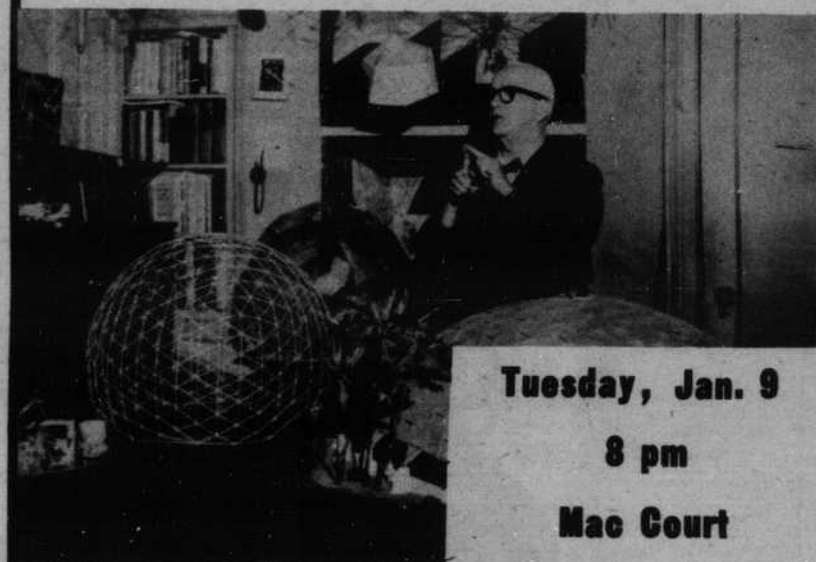
All of the 71 countries currently represented at the University have shown a decrease in enrollment from previous years, except Hong Kong, says Ghent. Hong Kong students outnumber any other single national group with a total of 165 students. Canada runs a close second to this figure with 112 students.

The most commonly selected fields of study for the foreign students at the University are business administration, architecture, and physical education and recreation.
