New arts exhibits open at EMU and museum

New exhibitions opened Sunday in both the Museum of Art and the EMU Art Gallery at the University.

"Mastercrafts: Northwest Award Winners," oil paintings by Philip Behymer, and watercolors by Mel Vincent will open in the Museum of Art, and a photography exhibition, "The Land and the Sea" by Paul Macapia, will open in the EMU Art Gallery.

Admission to both the museum and the EMU Art Gallery is free. Hours at the EMU are 7 a.m. to 11 p.m., Monday through Thursday; 7 a.m. to 12 midnight, Friday and Saturday; and 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., Sunday. Museum hours are noon to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday.

Today the public may attend a free gallery talk at 4 p.m., in the EMU Art Gallery by Paul Macapia. Macapia is a medical photographer from Seattle, who is well-known in his field of science. Formerly director of medical photography for the Mason Clinic in Seattle, he is now free-lancing in medical communications and the art world. He has a

commission to photograph the Asiatic Art Collection for the Seattle Art Museum.

An important aspect of Macapia's photographs is his observation of the formal compositions rendered by nature herself, as the drifting of seaweed and leaves over rocks or the interweaving of aging tree branches. Unique in his work are transilluminated photographs in which light is projected from behind

Speaking in harsh terms, Anderson called for the city to "hold the line" on fringe area development. "We can no longer tolerate situations involving large developments on the city's borders which will eventually cost all city residents."

He urged that services, such as water, sewage and electricity, be financed by the developers at the time of construction so that later on, the city wouldn't get stuck with the bill.

Anderson said that he did not expect significant action by the state on the numerous tax problems and expressed disappointment that the federal revenue sharing funds allocated to the city were "less than the expected bounty."

"We do know that local taxpayers are continuing to feel the squeeze of demand on their resources, the mayor said. "Rising cost and misplaced priorities affect us all."

Exhibit features gold rush memoirs

A collection of diaries, letters, maps, guidebooks and photographs recalling the Klondike Gold Rush of 75 years ago is on display in the Special Collections area of the University

The collection is from the records of the Alaska Mining and Prospecting Company of Elmira, N.Y., presented to the library in 1959 by the late Mrs. Hugh Sherwood of Portland.

The Alaska Mining and Prospecting Company was formed in 1897, a few weeks after news of the Klondike gold strike

The party, led by experienced New York geologist Andrew Sherwood, was financed by the sale of more than 25,000 shares of stock

Sherwood, with a party of six including his son, Hugh, went to the Klondike overland from British Columbia. They used the so-called Teslin Trail, the "poor man's route." The group reached the gold fields too late in the season of 1898 to prospect or mine. They wintered in Wrangell, "one of the wickedest places on earth."

Discouraged by the prospects and dismayed by the condition of the country, the Sherwood party left Wrangell in the spring of 1899 and returned to Elmira with nothing but a grand adventure to show for their efforts and trouble.

The exhibit includes the diaries of Hugh Sherwood, reports by Andrew Sherwood, correspondence and records of the Alaska Mining and Prospecting Company, a map of the Teslin Trail and photographs of the expedition members.

The exhibit will be up through February.
