Car accidents kill two

Two University students died this weekend in automobile accidents.

Charles David Warne, 20, of Santa Cruz, California, was killed early Saturday morning when struck by a car at the corner of 18th and Emerald, according to Eugene police.

The incident was reported to police at 3:41 a.m. by the Eugene-Springfield Ambulance Service who had been summoned to the scene. Warne was taken to Sacred Heart Hospital where a hospital spokesman said he died approximately five hours later.

Police reported that Warne, a resident of the Sigma Chi fraternity at 1440 East 19th Street, was involved in a fraternity initiation when the accident occurred. Sigma Chi President Richard Debernardi said that Warne was not one of the initiates.

A witness interviewed later by Eugene police, and also a member of Sigma Chi, told officers that he had seen a figure (Warne) wearing dark trousers, a cape and a black or dark-colored hood. Warne was a junior in pre-dentistry.

Police said that the incident is still under investigation.

Mary Sue Sublette

At approximately 10 p.m. Friday night a vehicle carrying Mary Sue Sublette, 18, a freshman from Medford was struck from behind while traveling on Friendly St. at 24th Ave.

Three other persons, in addition to Sublette, were injured when the car caught fire. All of the injured were taken to Sacred Heart Hospital, where the

three less severely injured persons were treated and released. Sublette died early Saturday morning from what a hospital spokesman described as head injuries.

Dellenback says 'no'

"No."

That is what Congressman John Dellenback (R-Fourth District) said his vote would be if a bill to cut off funds for the Vietnam war was voted on at the present time.

Dellenback is hopeful that the negotiations presently underway in Paris will result in a cease-fire agreement and cited these talks as the reason for his present position on the war funding issue.

He refused to discuss with newsmen at his Friday morning press conference in Eugene City Hall what his position would be in the future should the negotiations fail and massive bombing of civilian population centers be resumed.

However, the congressman was critical of the recent heavy bombing of North Vietnam. He said the move "came as a surprise" and that he was "deeply disappointed."

"The bombing of civilians in the North appalls me," Dellenback said.

Having just completed a week long fact-finding survey of his district, Dellenback said that public opinion on the war was still "polarized and very far apart."

At the beginning of the press conference, the congressman issued a short statement on the relaxation of wage and price controls in the recently an-

nounced Phase III of the Nixon economic game plan.

"I'm delighted," he said. "It is a significant move in the right direction."

Dellenback indicated that he felt the "loosening up of controls" was "a clear indication of the direction the administration was moving."

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The DIC's library houses over 200 books (most of which can be checked out by individuals needing drug-related information), numerous medical ar-

It is a free, anonymous service to the people of Lane County whereby an individual may have an illegal street drug analyzed and obtain the results of this testing either through the Drug Information Center or local news media channels.

The Drug Information Center has a staff of 30, and is open from 9 to 9 Monday through Friday, and 12 to 6 p.m. Saturday. A good number of books and files may be checked out by individuals, either from the University or community and we are located in Rm. 1 in the basement of the Erb Memorial Student Union on the University of Oregon Campus.
