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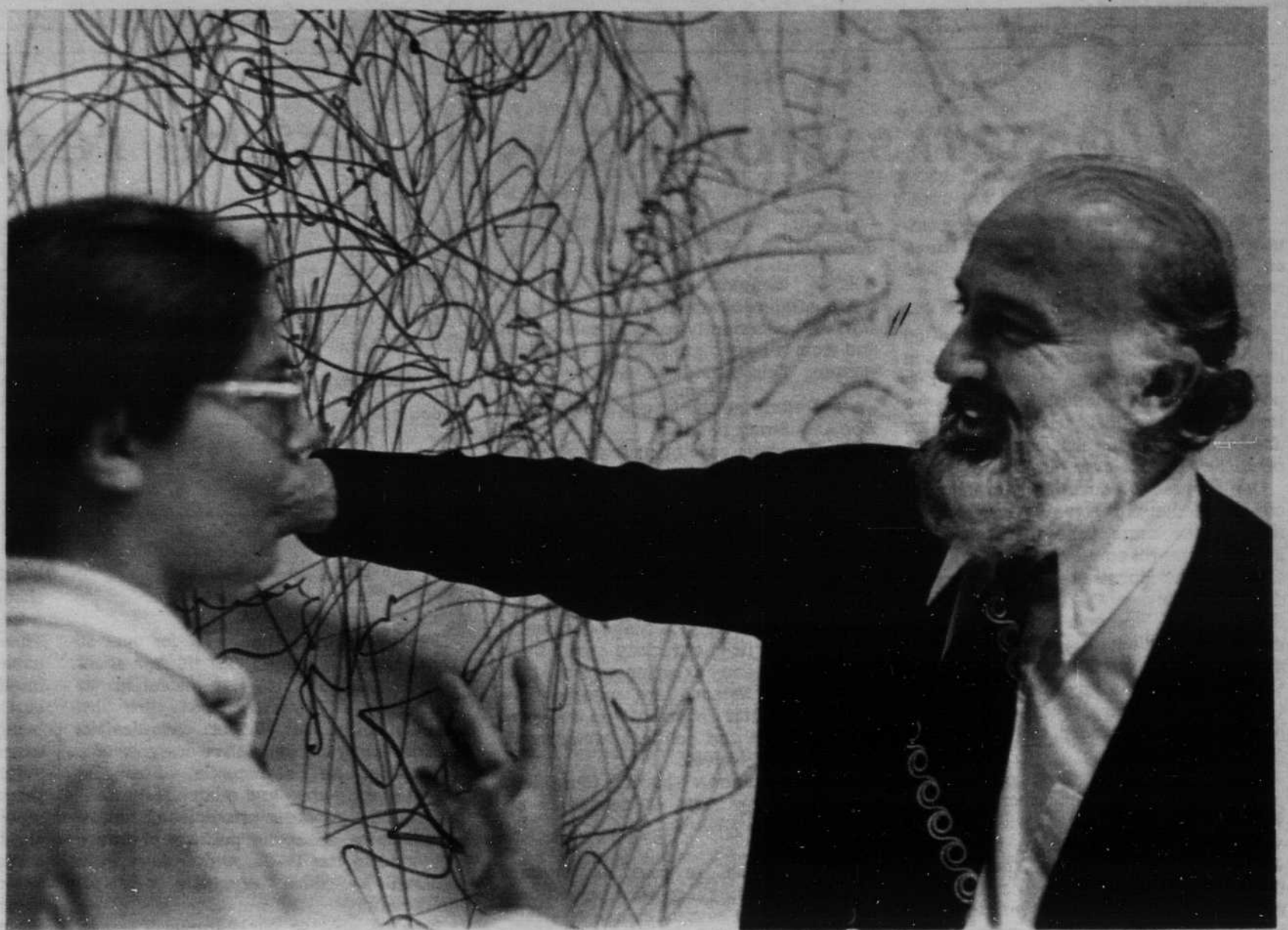

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now funded by allocations of incidental fee money. And Lieuallen stressed that under the new amendment, Student Senates would continue to have the power to allocate money to any organization including non-University organizations such as OSPIRG.

He said the major problem with the original OSPIRG funding was that the fee was a mandatory one.

Students talking with the Chancellor were concerned that the State Board would begin to approve or disapprove individual programs funded by the incidental fee money. "Board Members have neither the time or the inclination to become involved in that detail," Lieuallen said.

Proof of that statement could be that though the State Board has always had the power to approve or disapprove specific programs (because it has the final say over institutions' budget requests), it took legislative action to deal with the problem of OSPIRG assessing mandatory fees on students.

Another student complaint was the fact that the Chancellor's proposal specifically states that the Board has the power to decide which programs are "necessary or advantageous . . . for the cultural and physical development of students."

Lieuallen pointed out that the

original wording also gave the Board this power, though it wasn't as specifically stated. "If this language makes the proposal more palatable to Sen. Newbry, we should include it," he said.

Student reaction to the Chancellor's proposal seemed generally favorable. Joan Eggleston, IUS state chairer said, "I think the Chancellor's proposal is a good one if, in fact, the State Board will not become more directly involved in approving or disapproving student programs."

But it's an issue she is going to watch very carefully, she said.

She said she has applied for revenue sharing money, and has also written to private individuals and organizations for contributions. She estimates the center needs at least \$7000 to complete this term. The ASUO, Keenan said, supports the center's efforts, but can't offer any financial aid.

Keenan said the ASUO center is offering written support to a group of Portland State University students who plan to file suit against the CSD for the action taken in setting the new criteria.

Legislators and state officials are meeting with CSD representatives today to clarify and finalize the new standards. If the standards go into effect Feb. 1, about 70 children will be cut from the ASUO program.

Feb. 1 also marks the departure of Richard Trafton as director of the Lane 4-C Council. Trafton, who had expressed dissatisfaction with the cuts made by the state in the local 4-C budget in October, said he was leaving his post "to get into a job that has some future."
