Former Yale design Dean to speak

Connecticut architect Charles Moore, the former dean of the Yale University School of Design and Planning, will discuss his recent works in a free public lecture Wednesday at the University.

Moore, whose appearance is sponsored by the Department of Architecture, will speak at 8 p.m., in 177 Lawrence Hall. His talk will be illustrated with slides.

He is a former partner in the Oregon firm of Moore, Lyndon, Turnbull and Whitaker. He is currently teaching at Yale, and has an independent practice in Centerbrook, Conn.

Moore's principle works are the Sea Ranch condominium in California, the Swim and Tennis Club for the Ranch, the Faculty Club for the University of California at Santa Barbara.
