Angus McDonald, Ph.D. candidate from the University of California at Berkeley, recently returned to the United States after two years of research in the Far East on the early career and political environment of Mao Tse-tung's life, will be delivering a talk on:

"The Urban Origins of Rural Revolution in China", at 8 p.m., Thursday, January 25 in 101 EMU.

The talk will be sponsored by the University's East Asian Society.

Mr. McDonald has recently uncovered a number of significant writings from Mao's largely unknown career in the early 1920's, and will present some of his thoughts on this stage of the Chinese revolution.

Princeton professor to speak tonight

MAI to sponsor benefit dinner

Want to sample authentic Vietnamese food and do something to help the survivors of the war?

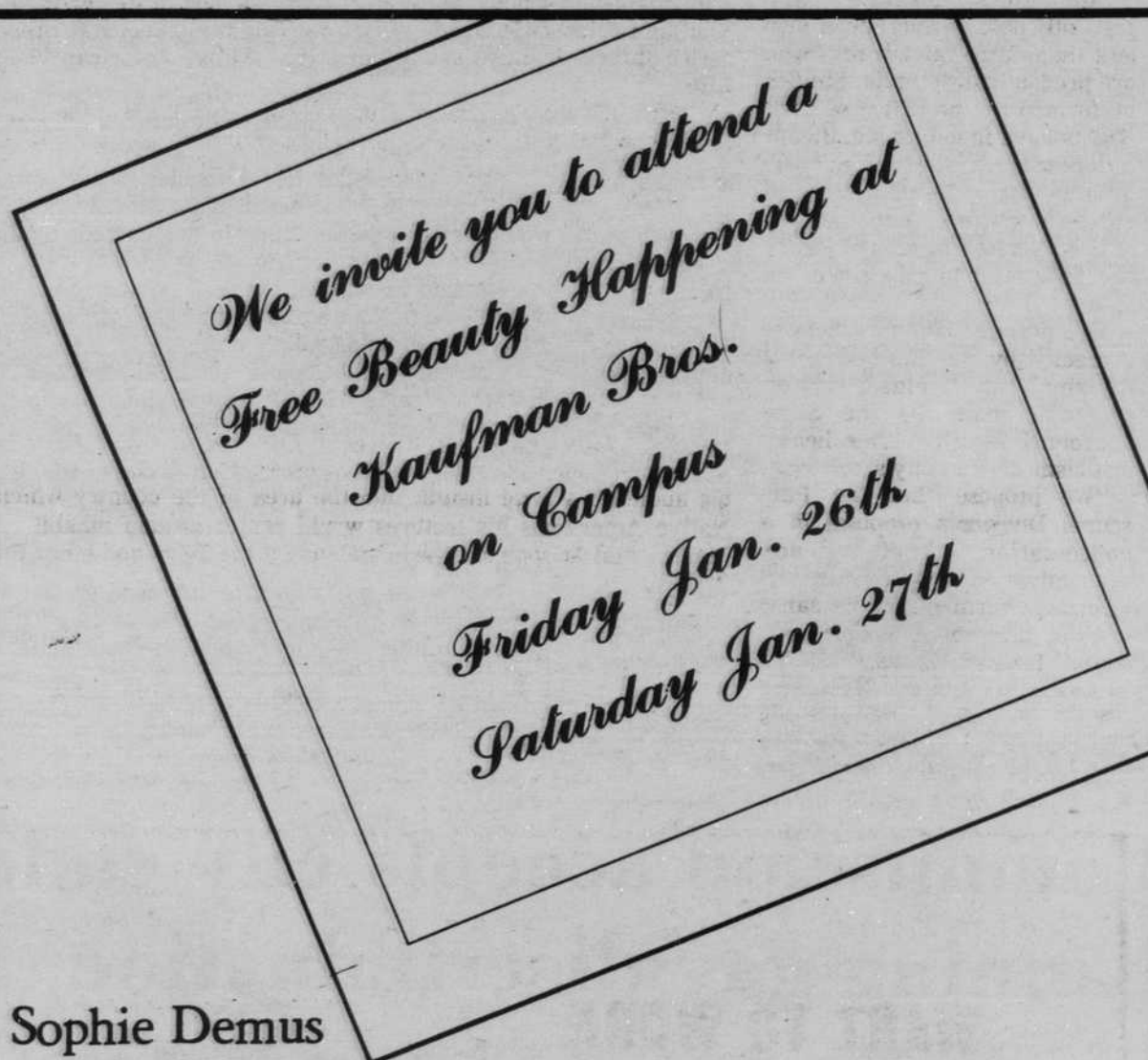
Medical Aid for Indochina invites you to a Vietnamese dinner, Friday, January 26, 6 p.m., at Central Presbyterian Church, 1475 Ferry. The menu is chicken with many vegetables, nuoc mam sauce, steamed rice, green tea and sesame cookies. Suggested donation is \$1.50, children under 12, \$.50.

"Village by Village", a documentary filmed in Vietnamese hospitals depicting the need for and use of medical aid, will be shown after the dinner.

Eugene MAI, a coalition of local peace groups, is sponsoring the benefit. Child care will be provided by the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

MAI was started two years ago in Newton, Massachusetts. To date various chapters around the country have sent to Indochina equipment and supplies totaling \$87,694.51. No money is sent only actual supplies requested. Cost of some needed items are: \$1,000 for one implantable pacemaker to regulating heartbeat, \$500 to \$900 for one complete set of surgical instruments for specific surgery, i.e. eye, chest, etc., under \$500 for I.V. plastic tubing for infant feeding, one portable oxygen life support system.

Eugene MAI which began its fund solicitation two months ago has raised about \$2500 so far. To get involved in helping at the dinner or in future activities, call the Peace Center, 345-4871.
