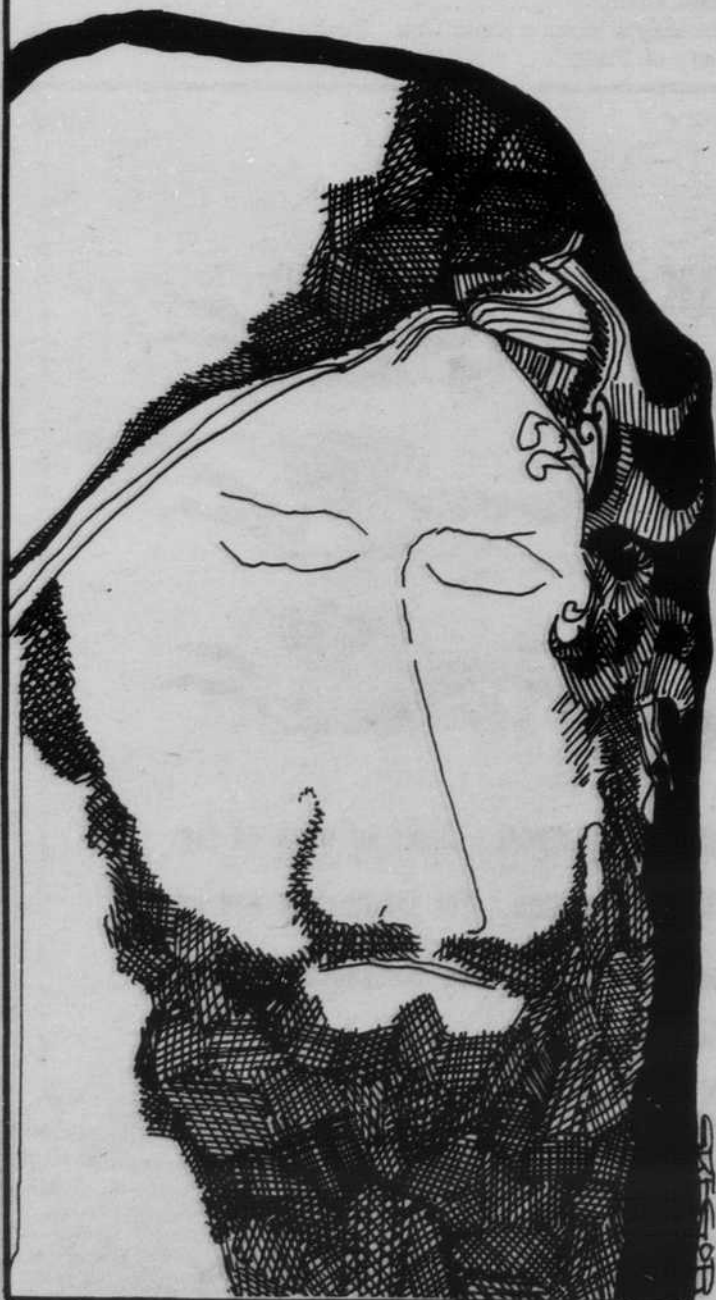

Sailing Club offers classes in boat building

If you're interested in some form of sailing—whether you would just like to learn how or are building your own boat, the University's Sailing Club could have a place for you.

According to Mary Leitschuh, secretary of the club, the club is "hoping to get people who don't know anything about sailing to come and find out about learning how to sail and what they can do in the club. We want to get more members in the club so we can do more things. We want to en-

courage people who don't know anything about it to come and learn."

The club is planning a cruise of the San Juan Islands during spring vacation and a slide show of the San Juan area will be presented at the meeting by Mike Hughes. Hughes is interested in getting together with people interested in boat building and, according to Leitschuh, is building a concrete sailboat.

Sailing classes will be available spring quarter carrying one P.E. credit hour under CPE 157. The class will carry a \$15 fee for maintenance of the boats, the Skipper's test (a test of ability to handle the boat) and the membership fee. This quarter members of the club will give lessons to people interested in learning sailing on an informal basis. "It's something we thought up," said Leitschuh, "with members willing to just go out and teach people."

The club is presently not funded through the University and gets its money through dues and movies. While it originally started out as a state corporation, according to Jack Powers, vice commodore, it is now becoming a club sport which means it can develop a racing team to compete intercollegiately.

Presently the club owns two boats, C-Lark 14-footers, and has four other boats on loan from the YMCA at Dexter Reservoir. Spring quarter the club hopes to purchase more boats but they currently need more money.

Last year the club was small. According to Leitschuh, "Not many people knew about it. It was more or less a group of friends. We want to open it up to anybody who's interested." This year the club has about 40 or 50 members.

Those interested in racing will find the club has a program for racing, coached by Mike Sherlock. Two years ago the University Sailing Team competed in the Douglas Cup races in Long Beach, Calif., although most of the regattas they take part in are usually in the North.

Officers of the club are Mike Runyon, commodore; Jack Powers, vice commodore; Paula Smith, treasurer; and Mary Leitschuh, secretary. Faculty advisor is Paul Campbell of the Department of Education.
