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Strike vote postponed

The Eugene Education Association (EEA) has postponed the calling of a strike vote until after the Eugene School Board budget committee meets Feb. 15.

A strike vote had been tentatively set for tomorrow.

The action came Tuesday afternoon at a special meeting of EEA representatives at the King's Table in the Oakway Mall.

The EEA action committee recommended to the representatives that the strike vote be delayed until a clear-cut salary decision had been reached by the school board.

The Eugene School Board Monday night voted to send the teacher's salary question back to the budget committee after listening to an hour-and-a-half presentation by state and local teachers organizations.

The dispute centers around a \$200 difference between the \$7,350 starting salary adopted by the school board and the \$7,550 starting salary recommended by an outside fact finder.

Faculty to discuss transfer credits

What University policy should be for accepting transfer credits will be discussed by the general faculty in its meeting at 3:30 p.m. today in room 150 Science.

George Dawon for the Admissions Policy Committee will present a motion which recommends the following restriction on transfer credit:

— "Credit earned in lower division terminal vocational courses will not be accepted."

— "Credit earned in lower division technological courses will not be accepted unless equivalent courses are offered at the University or its off-campus schools of Medicine, Nursing and Dentistry."

The Faculty Senate voted down the Admissions Policy Committee's motion in favor of a liberal transfer credit motion advocated by an Ad Hoc Committee on Academic Requirements.

The Academic Requirements Committee has proposed a three-way classification system for accepting credit transfers:

— The University should authorize credit for all academic courses taken at two year colleges.

— The University should give 48 hours for professional courses and expand its definition of "profession course" from medicine, dentistry, nursing, medical technology and law to include upper division professional work in programs accredited by professional organizations leading to specialized degrees.

— That the University should accept up to 24 hours for skills courses, but with no more than 12 in one skills area. (The present legislation allows students 12 hours in P.E. and 12 hours in music, but none in vocational technical courses.

Other business on the agenda includes a State of the University address by President Clark, a motion to set up a five-person Ad Hoc Committee on Promotion and Tenure, and a motion by Peter Sherman, chair of the Student Conduct Committee, to revise the Student Conduct Code.

Also, the faculty has a list of back motions to consider such as a motion to issue tickets to visitors at faculty meetings, a motion to change 10 anthropology from social science to science courses, and a motion to include "Friends of the University" on the Intercollegiate Athletics Committee.
