In the original motion the Admissions Policy Committee advocated that "credit earned in lower division terminal vocational courses will not be accepted."

Speaking for the liberal amendments to the motion Robert Harris, Architecture, said that 12 hours of credit for skills area students who are transferring into the University from a junior college is a small amount of credit.

These courses have value to the individual and "we do live in an environment full of all kinds of things to depend upon" Harris said.

However, another faculty member said the real questions should be: "Are the skills courses deserving of academic credit? And if this is the issue, do we want more of it or less. I say, we at least don't want any more."

Robert Bowlin, Dean of Student Personnel Services spoke in favor of the IAC motion, saying "When we are seeking increasing financial help from members of the public, they should have a voice."

James Klonoski, political science said "I've been a long-time student of intercollegiate athletics. My impression is that nothing pervades the University more than our friends, the public. But I don't think we need three members on a committee because we have 10,000 people who will react. The athletic program is suspended in the public and three members is eyewash."

However, George Struble, computer science, said that including members of the public on the committee is a way for two way communication, the University's story and the public's story.

Zukin, speaking against the motion, said "athletics is for the students. If this motion is passed the student ration on the committee would go from 7 to 3 to 10 to 3. Pressure from the alumni forced Jerry Frei to resign. Students didn't want him to quit just because he didn't beat Oregon State."

The faculty also approved that courses in physical anthropology (Anthropology 101, 320, 321, 322, 323, 324, 475, 476, 477, 478, and 479 be classified as Science group requirement courses rather than Social Science group requirement courses.

The effective date for this change is Fall term 1973 "with the provision that students enrolled during the current school year (1972-73) may opt for one or the other by submitting a petition if they wish science credits or accepting social science credit under the old rule."

A motion of Bower Ally, speech, to issue tickets to visitors attending faculty meetings was tabled by the faculty.

The following notices of motion were given by Zukin for consideration by the faculty at the next faculty meeting:

- That three student members be appointed to the Deans Advisory Committee of the college of liberal arts.
- That the English Composition, Physical Education and Health requirements be eliminated.
- That the group requirements for liberal arts majors be reduced from 18 credit hours to nine credit hours in each of the three groups—humanities, physical sciences and social sciences.
- That courses numbered 199 and 400-410 should be able to fulfill group requirements.

Feminists award money to nurse's aids

Gayle Brauner, a nurse's aide at Pleasant Valley Nursing Home, Tuesday night received a \$15 donation from the University Feminists, to be used in the formation of an association of nurse's aides in Eugene.

The money was earmarked for use in printing informational leaflets and brochures announcing the movement and its goals.

Mary Pauli, coordinator of the feminist group, said that the contribution was in line with the group's policy of "becoming more involved with women in the community."

According to Brauner, a grievance meeting for women employed as nurse's aides will be held at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, February 15, at the Central Presbyterian Church. Topics to be discussed involve problems shared by the aides and possible solutions, she said.

"Women with concerns in other areas of employment discrimination may be interested in attending as well," said Brauner.

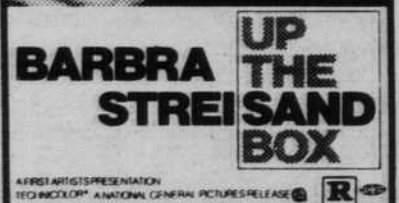
