### Leather craftsman featured in EMU

The Craftsmen's Corner, a new program sponsored by the EMU continues this week with featured Craftsman Brooks Hodapp who specializes in leather. The Craftsman will set up a small booth in the EMU Fishbowl to demonstrate, exhibit and sell his craft.

The Corner will operate Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

### Creative writing sessions slated

The public is invited to attend a series of free sessions Tuesday through Thursday at the University focusing on "Fiction: Experiments in Style and Form—Personal Reflections of Modern Life."

Three writers noted for their work in experimental fiction will be on the campus to discuss their own works and other ideas relevant to fiction and the modern era.

Sessions will be 2 to 4 p.m., and 8 to 10 p.m., each day, in the EMU. Room numbers will be posted.

The visiting writers are George Chambers of Bradley University in Illinois, winner of the Panache Prize for experimental fiction; Ronald Sukenick, author of "The Death of the Novel and Other Stories," and several other books; and Paul Friedman of the University of Illinois at Urbana, author of "And If Defeated Alleged Fraud," a collection of short stories.

The symposium is sponsored by the Creative Writing Program at the University and financed by a grant from the University's Office of Scientific and Scholarly Research.

The guest authors' books will be available at the Co-op and other books stores in the area.

### ECC member appointed to committee

Betty Waletich, University student member of the Education Coordinating Council (ECC), has been appointed to a steering committee that will investigate recommendations the ECC made at its last meeting in January. The recommendations concern searching for ways to match school output with occupational need.

Among the various recommendations is one for a job clearing house to co-ordinate the needed occupational services with the skills being taught in school, along with one making field work mandatory for a degree in any Human Resource type field.

"It is important that we show this responsibility to the students," Waletich said.

### Woodwind recital scheduled for tonight

The University's Woodwind Quintet will give a recital at the School of Music Recital Hall at 8 p.m. tonight. Members of the quintet are Richard Trombley, flute; Robert Cunningham, oboe; John McManus, clarinet; Peter Berquist, bassoon; Edward Kammerer, horn.

The program will include The Quintet in E Minor by Anton Reichner, a contemporary of Beethoven and quintets by two prominent composers of the 20th Century, "A Little Chamber Music" by Paul Hindemith, and "Quintette en forme de Choros" by Heitor Villa-Lobos.

### Films highlight Heart Week

The University Sophomore Class Council is sponsoring Heart Week from February 12-17 for the benefit of the Heart Fund.

Tonight will be Old-Time Movie Night featuring movie shorts including Charlie Chaplin "Highlights"; Andy Clyde in "Boobs in the Woods"; W.C. Fields in "Dentist"; Laurel and Hardy in "Help Mates"; and the Three Stooges in "Creeps."

The movies will be shown at 7 and 9:30 p.m. in 150 Science. Admission will be \$1.

Friday evening, Feb. 17, the class is sponsoring a dance in the EMU Ballroom with the group "Coal" from 8-12 a.m. Admission will be \$1.50.

### New library dean sought

A faculty-student committee has been charged with the task of finding a new dean for the University's School of Librarianship. The committee, chaired by Journalism Professor Charles Duncan, is seeking prospective applicants for the position which will become available July 1, 1974.

Perry Morrison, the present dean of the school, will resign his position at the end of this academic year. Elizabeth Findly, professor of librarianship, will take the post for a year before retiring at the end of the 1973-74 school year.

The committee was formed about three weeks ago at the direction of Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Provost Harry Alpert. It consists of seven faculty members and two students. The group has held one organizational meeting, according to Duncan.

### Harpsichord master set for Sunday

One of the few modern time experts on the harpsichord will be a performer at the School of Music's second Chamber Music Concert scheduled Feb. 18. Joan Benson, internationally known keyboard artist, will perform at 8 p.m. in the School of Music Recital Hall.

Besides her Sunday night performance, Benson will conduct a Harpsichord Masterclass from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon at the Recital Hall.

Benson, recipient of the Kate Neal Kinley Award, is a member of the music faculty at Stanford. Her unique repertoire includes works of such well known artists as Mozart, Beethoven, Haydn and Bach. She is credited with bringing new life to the music from the 15th through the 18th centuries and with encouraging the composition of contemporary works.
