Airport security

Police observe screening

U.S. District Court Judge John Lewis Smith ruled Monday in Washington, D.C. that all interstate airports must go ahead with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) requirements for the presence of armed police officers.

Eugene was several days ahead of the ruling — four Eugene Police officers have been working at Mahlon Sweet Airport since Feb. 5. FAA regulation 107 calls for the presence of "a uniformed, armed

law enforcement officer with local jurisdiction." Mahlon Sweet is city property located outside the city limits.

Officer Dave Jordan of the Eugene Police Department (EPD) serves as Airport Security Supervisor. He and the three other men on the detail are present at the boarding of every commercial flight leaving Eugene. Jordan explained that the FAA provides for the officers to "provide emergency service" to the airlines personnel who conduct boarding screening.

Jordan stressed that the officers do not search passengers or directly participate in the screening

process, which is conducted by employees of the airlines with metal detectors. Jordan said the officers are there to witness the screening and "act as a deterrent and to provide such emergency protection as is necessary."

The FAA guidelines state that both the purpose of the mandatory screening procedures and the presence of police officers is to prevent any "explosive or dangerous weapons" from being carried aboard aircraft. If any other contraband is discovered the officer is prepared to handle it. All carry-on baggage must be searched and all passengers must pass through a metal detector before they are allowed to board. Refusal to do so will prevent them from boarding the aircraft.

Jordan emphasized the main purpose of the officers is to provide backup. He commented that "you can't expect untrained airline personnel to handle an emergency situation involving weapons."

The officers assigned to the airport have received some 40 hours of additional specialized instruction on federal laws relating to inter-state commerce and relevant state laws.

Cap. Patrick Larion, EPD patrol commander said the officers are present at the airport only during aircraft boarding. Since this only takes up about half of an eight hour shift, the officers augment regular patrols in adjoining areas and at Valley River Center. The cost of the officers will be about \$35,000 for the airport duty. Larion said the funds for this would come out of either the proposed airport boarding tax or city revenue-sharing funds.
