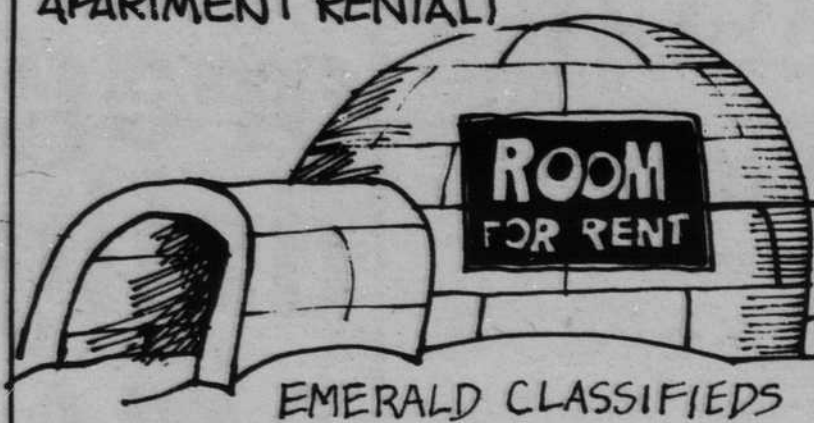
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On Campus

Directorship candidate on campus today

Native American candidate for Ethnic Studies Program director George Mills will be available at the University to consult with Native American students today during the late morning, according to the University's Office of Academic Affairs. Students wishing to talk to Mills can contact the office, 103 Johnson, x.3081.

Mills, who is on campus for appointments with various University officials, has served as a consultant to the Project Indian Education program at the University of South Dakota, and as director of Career Opportunity Programs in Spokane. He has worked in the field of adult education and is presently a guidance counselor in the Spokane, Wash. public education system.

The Office of Academic Affairs incorrectly told the Emerald Wednesday that Mills currently teaches mentally retarded students at Eastern Washington State College. He worked designing curriculum for the mentally retarded for the Spokane area public schools during 1971.
