Foreign student to discuss civil rights

Babak Zahraie, former president of the Foreign Student Council at the University of Washington, will talk on "Civil Rights for Foreign Students," at 4 p.m. today in the EMU Dad's Room.

Zahraie was ordered deported by the Seattle immigration office on March 14, 1972 according to the Committee to Defend Babak Zahraie. The committee says Zahraie has spoken out against the Vietnam War and in defense of the democratic rights of Iranian political prisoners.

Zahraie is currently on a speaking tour of the United States.

Attorney General to speak

Attorney General Lee Johnson will speak to a political science class at 7 p.m. today in 107 Lawrence.

Johnson will answer questions from a panel of students enrolled in a course called the "Allocation of Justice," taught by James Klonoski.

The panel will ask questions structured around the premise that justice is best understood in a political sense and that the legal system is a sub-system in the larger political context.

During the course, the panel members have questioned "actors" in the legal system such as District Attorney J. Pat Horton; Eugene police chief Dale Allen; and Lane County Sheriff Dave Burkes.

Meditation lecture set for tonight

Peter Muldavin, "one of the first teachers of Transcendental Meditation in the United States," will speak on campus tonight on the benefits of Transcendental Meditation.

Muldavin's speech, sponsored by the Eugene chapter of the Student International Meditation Society (SIMS), will be at 8 p.m. in 113 Commonwealth, according to Stephanie Axelband, Eugene SIMS president.

Axelband said Muldavin is a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley.

Haganah speaker scheduled

The Rev. John Grauel will speak at 8 p.m. today in the EMU. Grauel was a crew member of the ship "Exodus," a member of the Haganah and a member of the United Nations committee which helped establish Israel.

Grauel's talk is sponsored by the Jewish Student Union.

Feminists to hear media panel

The University Feminists will discuss women in media tonight at 8 p.m. in the EMU. A panel, with Rustie Henry, Emerald Advertising manager; Charlotte Mills, Valley News; Shirley Shepard, of KEZI-TV; Eileen Feilds, of KZEL; and a representative of the Women's Press will be presented.

Folk balladeer to perform

Kathy Smith, a folk balladeer, will be the featured artist of the EMU Fishbowl Follies this week. Her performances will be held in the EMU Fishbowl on Tuesday and Thursday evening at 8:30 p.m. Smith has played at several local concerts and has recorded two albums.

The Follies will also include its regular Wednesday night "Free Mike" program.

Ceramics department exhibits works

There will be an exhibition of current ideas and work by the students and staff of the ceramics department in 141 Lawrence until Friday. The showing will be open daily from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Professor's work chosen for publication

The work of Jan Zach, University art professor, has been chosen to appear in a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) publication now being prepared as part of the National Community Art Competition.

Zach is a well-known sculptor whose large stainless steel works have been featured in international exhibitions as well as local shopping centers.

His concern in sculpture is with the illumination of forms in space, using the resultant shadows and reflections, created by solar or artificial light, as the means of expressing space.

More than 1700 entries from artists in 46 states and six foreign countries competed for the right to appear in the HUD publication. A representative illustration of Zach's work will be used in the book.

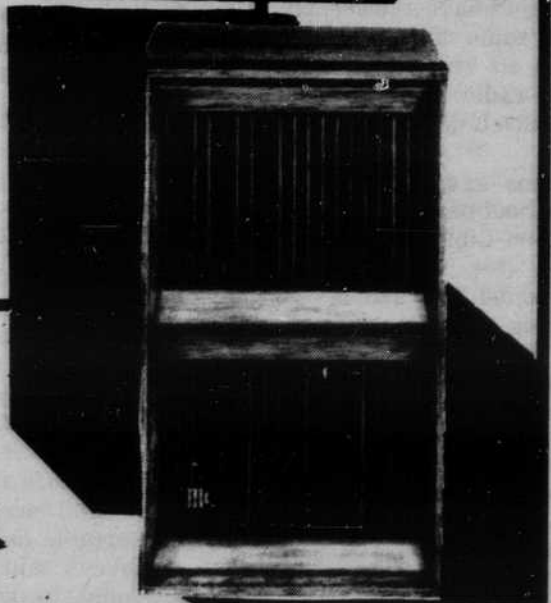
