

In 'Kangaroo court'

Loveys ousting considered

Larry Taylor, Mike Bonner, Hank Itkin and Mike Ignatius, all former members of the ASUO Governing Committee, met Monday to decide on impeachment proceedings for ASUO Vice President Fred Loveys and the ASUO Elections Board.

The purpose of the meeting was questionable, since under Amendment "A", — which passed 700 to 243 during last week's general election, the governing committee is defunct.

Although the senate is still contesting the validity of the election, ASUO President Bill Wyatt declared the election valid Monday and proceeded to close the doors to any further senate actions.

In a memorandum issued Monday, ASUO controller Tom Johnson stated that "as of February 26, 1973, the budget for the ASUO Senate is frozen completely. They are not permitted to schedule rooms, use the print shop, retain anyone on payroll, use the Watts line or Tele-Pak or use State cars. Those organizations who have allocations under the Senate's budget will still have access to their funds."

The memorandum went on to remove committee chairers

Gordon King, Peggy O'Farrell, Bob Reno and Fred Wasson and Senate President Cliff Zukin from the payroll. Senate secretary Anne Tileston will remain on payroll to tend office matters.

Although the former chairman of the governing committee, Gordon King, was absent, the four ex-senators met undaunted. "We have to go on the assumption that the election was invalid and the senate still exists," said Itkin. The meeting was held in the senate conference room because the usual meeting place of the governing committee, 315 EMU, was locked in compliance with Wyatt's orders to curtail room scheduling by the senate.

Taylor, Itkin, Bonner and Ignatius voted to impeach the Elections Board and Loveys.

Ignatius referred to the meeting as a "kangaroo court," and said that he didn't think they knew whether any of the board members were guilty of elections violations. "I don't think we're reviewing any evidence," he said.

But Itkin claimed that the board was responsible for the violations. "I'd say we're within our rights to impeach every one of them," he said. The resolution to impeach the elections board passed two to one.

The four ex-senators then voted three to zero to impeach Loveys.

Itkin presented several elections complaints in support of the impeachment. Most referred to Loveys' use of German ballot slogans. Itkin felt they were "discriminating against the students who are unable to understand German."

After the meeting, Bonner said that "the only people that see the senate as being duly abolished are the executives."

EMU Director Dick Reynolds, contacted after the meeting, commented on the lock-out procedures.

"If the election was valid, that was the proper thing for Wyatt to do," he said. He declined to comment on whether he felt the election was valid or not.

But in reference to the Senate deciding on the validity of an election concerning its own abolishment, he said "it does seem ridiculous that an outgoing government would have to give its consent."

"No governing body is better than the people who are willing to accept it," he added.

Election complaints filed by ex-senators

Two complaints regarding alleged election violations occurring in last week's general elections have been filed by former senators John Stewart and Hank Itkin.

The complaints charge that ASUO President Bill Wyatt and Vice President Fred Loveys violated Section I, clauses A and B of the ASUO Election Rules. Clause A protects the best interests of the Student Body in ASUO Elections. Clause B states that the "fairness and equality of the electoral process is to be

respected by all members of the ASUO."

The complaint by Stewart charged that "pollworkers . . . tried to influence my votes with regards to ballot measures A and D and made false statements to me concerning these measures."

The complaints advocate fining Loveys and Wyatt \$50 each for the violations and invalidating the returns of the general election.

Loveys said that he could do nothing with the complaints, since there is nobody to consider them. Amendment "A", which passed 700 to 243 in the elections, abolished the senate and the Elections Court.

Loveys also commented that the two ex-senators which had filed the complaints had already filed to run for positions on the five-person incidental fee committee which was created by the abolishment amendment.

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Drug analysis report issued

The Drug Information Center has issued its 12th drug analysis report and with it a warning that an animal tranquilizer is being passed off as THC.

"The Drug Information Center has now found seven samples of PCP in the Eugene-Springfield area. PCP (Phencyclidine-Sernyl or Sernylan) is a potent animal tranquilizer. In humans it is a powerful hallucinogen with a number of adverse side effects. To date, all samples of alleged THC have been analyzed to be PCP," the report said.

Listed below are the results of the 13 samples tested in this report.

EO-1-31-01. Alleged content: Cocaine or Procaine; actual content: no cocaine, procaine, xylocaine—unidentifiable material; price: \$60 per gram; description: white crystalline powder.

EO-1-31-02. Alleged content: THC; actual content: PCP only; price: not given; description: white powder.

EO-1-31-03. Alleged content: hashish; actual content: THC only; price: not given; description: green vegetable material.

EO-1-31-05. Alleged content: opium; actual content: low quality hashish; price: \$120 per ounce; description: black, resinous material.

EO-2-01-01. Alleged content: unknown; actual content: phenobarbital and pentobarbital (bar-

biturates); price: not given; description: blue-gray powder.

EO-2-05-01. Alleged content: mescaline; actual content: LSD only; price: 25 cents a hit; description: white powder in clear capsule.

EO-2-06-01. Alleged content: LSD; actual content: LSD only; price: 50 cents a hit; description: white tablet.

EO-2-06-03. Alleged content: mescaline; actual content: LSD only; price: \$1 a hit; description: white powder in pink capsule.

EO-2-07-01. Alleged content: psilocybin; actual content: small doses of LSD; price: \$15 an ounce; description: dark brown ground-up mushroom.

EO-2-07-02. Alleged content: unknown; actual content: dazepam (Valium); price: not given; description: white tablet, five sixteenths of an inch in diameter by one-eighth of an inch thick.

EO-2-07-03. Alleged content: unknown; actual content: no identifiable drug, possibly a vitamin; price: not given; description: yellow capsule with white powder.

EO-2-07-04. Alleged content: unknown; actual content: no psychoactive drug present; price: not given; description: white powder.

EO-2-07-05. Alleged content: marijuana; actual content: THC present and marijuana; price: \$13 an ounce; description: green plant material.



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
