Film on reactor accident to be shown

The Atomic Energy Commission film "The SL 1 Accident Phases 1, 2 and 3," about the January 3, 1961 nuclear reactor testing station accident in Idaho will be shown next Monday and Tuesday from 1 to 3 p.m. in room 177 Lawrence.

The film separates the accident into three phases. Phase one: location of the problem, and rescue of the workers. Phase two: questions about the safety of a reactor and information on the reactor in general.
