Area groups express support for Sioux

Carl McClain of the United Indian Action Center in Portland told newsmen that "things are going to get a lot worse at Wounded Knee... the people there are completely willing to shoot it out" with the federal officers encircling the Indians encamped there.

At a press conference sponsored jointly by the Campus Radical Union, the Oregon Prisoner Coalition and the Native American Student Union, representatives announced their "unequivocal support" for the Sioux Indians holding Wounded Knee—the site of a massacre by U.S. Army troops 83 years ago.

The group called for a re-negotiation by Native Americans of all treaties between the government and the Indian nation and asked for Congressional and United Nations investigations into the plight of the Native American. The representatives also called for the removal of all federal officers from the area around Wounded Knee.

The group announced its intention to collect food, clothing and medical supplies to be taken to Wounded Knee by a caravan leaving Eugene today at 4 p.m.

McClain said that an "Indian problem in South Dakota is an Indian problem in Oregon" and that although Native Americans were here before the Whites "the Bureau of Indian Affairs denies us the right to negotiate our own property."

Another Native American from Portland echoed McClain's concern saying that "there is more concern about what's going on over in Vietnam than what's happening here in the United States."

When asked by one of the representatives from Portland why more Native Americans from Eugene weren't present, one of the spokesmen for the Eugene Liberation Support Movement said most of the Native American students "were afraid of reprisals from the administration."



Alumni director resigns

Richard Imwalle, director of alumni relations at the University since February, 1972, has resigned to accept the post of Director of the Major Giving Program with the Development staff at Pomona College, Claremont, California.

Imwalle's new position is effective in mid-April.

The position in Alumni Relations, a division of the Development Fund, is expected to be filled by the end of April, according to Carl Fisher, assistant to the President for University Development.

Fisher said that qualified University alumni will be interviewed and that, in the spirit of affirmative action, the University is encouraging women and minority graduates of the University to apply.
