Dreams subject of YMCA class

Beginning on Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. at the YMCA, a course will be offered on self images in dreams. The focus of the course will be on the identification of self images as they appear in dreams, daydreams, and fantasies, and upon the evaluation of these images.

Some attention will be paid to the historical use and understanding of dreams and to their current importance in psychotherapy. But the primary goal of the class is to look at the importance of dreams and dreamlike activity in the development of the mature person.

The course is intended to demonstrate that the awareness of self images in dreams can lead to a higher sense of self definition and self direction, and to a greater ability to shape one's self image.

The instructor for the course is Tom Giesen, who has taught at Tougaloo College and Lane Community College. Cost is \$10 for YMCA members and \$12 for non-members.

VVAW Hanoi visitor to speak

Barry Romo, a national coordinator for the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, Winter Soldier, will be speaking in Eugene at 7:30 Saturday, in the Central Presbyterian Church, 15th and Ferry.

In December 1972, former Army lieutenant Romo, Joan Baez, Telford Taylor, and Reverend Michael Allen, were invited to the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. When in Hanoi, the peace delegation witnessed the bombings of schools, nurseries and hospitals.

Also, Tell Them We Are People, a filmsrip on Vietnamese people and their culture will be shown.

UNIVERSITY CO-OP CAMPAIGN RULES 1973

I. Eligibility

- All candidates must be Co-op members.
- One (1) freshman will be elected for a one (1) year term.
Two (2) sophomores will be elected for two (2) year terms.
One (1) student at-large will be elected for a one (1) year term.
Two (2) graduate students will be elected for one (1) year terms.
One (1) faculty member will be elected for a two (2) year term.
All candidates must have a cumulative grade point average of not less than 2.00.

II. Nominations

Any Co-op member may nominate an eligible candidate at the annual meeting. A nominee does not need to be present.

Election

Election shall be by voting at a booth in the foyer or front of the Co-op. The date of voting shall be announced at the annual meeting.

IV. Promotional Material

- Posters may be placed in any residence hall, subject to the approval of the particular living organization.
- Posters may be placed on specified places in and on the Co-op building. (Bulletin board upstairs and downstairs, pillars on the outside, and brickwork on the outside.) The maximum size of poster used in and on the Co-op shall be 14" x 22".
- Any campaigning that violates any applicable law shall be prohibited.
- Posters shall not appear until the day following the annual meeting.

V. Expenditures

- Total campaign expenditures on the part of any candidate must not exceed \$25.00.
- Each candidate shall prepare a list of expenditures, including reasonable estimates of the value of donated materials. This list must be turned in to the store manager by 5:00 p.m. of the day before the election and must be signed by the candidate. Successful write-in candidates must submit their lists by noon of the following day of the election. Candidates should be prepared to prove by receipt or otherwise that all statements are accurate.

VI. Withdrawals

The names of all members nominated at the annual meeting shall appear on the ballot unless a written withdrawal is received by the vice-chairman of the Board or the store manager - not less than two days before the election

VII. Compliance

Each nominee or his agent will be furnished with a copy of rules, the Articles of Incorporation, and the By-laws of the corporation. An agreement to comply with the rules signed by the candidate must be received by the vice-chairman of the Board or the store manager not less than two days before the election.

VIII. Disqualifications

A candidate may be disqualified by a vote of 7 members of the Board of Directors for infractions committed by himself or anyone acting on his behalf.
