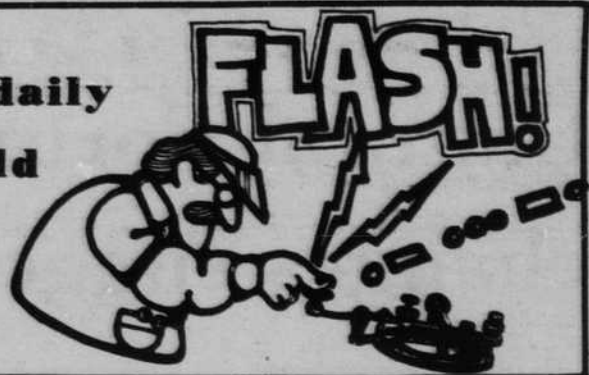


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Full rights bill to 18-year-olds introduced

SALEM (Special)—A "totally comprehensive" bill granting full legal rights to 18-year-olds has been introduced in the House as an attempt "to solve the legal limbo of those between the age of 18 and 21."

Rep. Mary Burrows (R-Eugene), a sponsor of the bill, explained in a Friday news conference that the present "legal limbo" is the result of past Oregon legislatures granting "18-year-olds partial statutory privileges and obligations." Currently 18-year-olds can vote, enter into contracts and serve on juries, she said.

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Burrows explained that the practical effect of the bill, HB 3167, "is to grant 18-year-olds the same rights that adults now enjoy." This would include giving 18-year-olds the right to buy and drink alcohol, form corporations, marry without parental consent and obtain licenses for professions such as attorney, doctor, dentist and public accountant.

Though a similar bill, SB 27, has been introduced in the Senate, ASUO President Bill Wyatt said young persons interested in the issue saw a need for the House bill "because SB 27 has received less than enthusiastic support and consideration in the Senate."

Wyatt said, "We feel there is support in the House which will hopefully spill over to the Senate."

He observed that the recent action of the Washington legislature lowering that state's drinking age to 19 years should help similar legislation in Oregon.

Rep. Stephen Kaffoury (D-Portland), another sponsor of the House bill, said that Oregon citizens won't want young persons going across the state border to drink.

Kaffoury, who chairs the Alcohol and Drugs committee, indicated that hearings on HB 3167 and SB 27 will be combined at an April 12 committee meeting.

Any University student wishing to testify April 12 should contact the ASUO legislative coordinators office in 309 EMU, Wyatt said.

Spring term degree applications due

The list of all degree candidates for spring term graduation is now being compiled by the Office of the Registrar. The last day upon which an application for degree can be filed for inclusion in this list is April 13, 1973. This date will be enforced because of the many operations of checking, clearing and printing which must follow.

To qualify for the degree applied for, a student must have completed all necessary work and procedures by the end of the term. All transcripts from other schools, including Division of Continuing Education, necessary for a degree should be sent to the attention of Graduation, Office of the Registrar, in order that it be on file by the Deadline, June 15, 1973.

Any student who has applied previously and did not receive the degree must reapply.
