German professor visiting campus

Professor Gerhard Nickel, head of the Department of English Linguistics at the University of Stuttgart, and widely recognized as a linguist, will be "personality-in-residence" in the University dormitories today Saturday, Monday morning and noon, Tuesday noon and evening. He will be available in the Carson Hall dining room at meal times to talk with students about Germany and about studying in Germany. The Oregon System of Higher Education, operates a German Study Center in Stuttgart, where Nickel teaches.

Nickel, who has been a linguistics consultant to educational television in Germany and a consultant on languages in a number of countries, will give a lecture on "Contrastive Studies in the Field of Civilization" Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Browsing Room of the EMU.

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students from receiving child care services.

However, a new clause in the state law says no new students may be admitted to the program but students already using the centers could continue to do so.

Keenan said that she would not know her other sources of income (such as Children's Services Division, 4Cs, welfare) until the legislative dilemma is straightened out.

She suggested that the ASUO could allot a certain amount of funds to the Child Care Center and hold the rest until the fall when she would be able to present a well-defined budget.

Keenan said it is a constant battle to keep up with state regulations. The program runs below state minimum requirements in some ways but she added that it is not negligent in regards to actual care of the children.

Ron Saylor came to the hearing to present the budget for Switchboard but, since the executive was already favorably inclined toward granting the \$847, he was not required to justify the budget. The money would be used to pay the Switchboard phone bill and the rent for the Eugene Youth Hostel.

Citing inflation and operating costs for its new addition, the EMU requested an increase of \$114,495 Saturday morning in incidental fee funding at a meeting of the ASUO executive board.

The EMU request, which totaled \$511,682, included funding for the Outdoor Program, Club Sports, the Crisis Center and the Women's Recreation Association, (WRA), as well as administrative and operating expenses.

Adell McMillan, EMU associate director, told the board she expected revenue to increase \$252,451 next year, but that expenses would probably increase \$366,945.

McMillan told the board that civil service employees had been given 6.5 per cent pay increases and that the EMU was waiting for the state legislature to decide on Oregon Daily Emerald

pay increases for other employees.

The "only brand new service" the EMU will offer next year is a crafts center, McMillan said. She said the EMU hoped to offset some of the center costs, including the salary of a program director, by establishing a fee system.

The new addition also will need two full-time custodians, she said.

Gary Bartlett, Club Sports coordinator, said the program's budget did not include any new sports. He felt it would be "unfair" to add new sports at the expense of the existing ones.

Bartlett also presented the WRA budget. It included a

AD proposed '73-'74 budget considers cost of living effect

The Athletic Department's proposed budget increase for the next year was influenced by an increase in the cost of living, Norv Ritchey, director of the department, said Saturday afternoon during the executive budget hearings.

It is doubtful that the ASUO can grant the department's \$200,000 request, said Bill Wyatt, ASUO president, because the total of all budget requests received by the ASUO would force a four-dollar increase per student in incidental fees.

Wyatt said there is a need for a formula on which to base year-to-year incidental fee allocations to the Athletic Department.

Ritchey suggested that the ASUO and the department decide upon a set incidental fee figure (he used \$150,000 as an example) and tie it to a cost index for price and wage increases.

Wyatt felt that setting a figure is a good idea, but the cost index might cause problems in that the

incidental fee charges might have to rise the same percentage.

Ritchey replied that without a cost index of some sort, ticket prices for athletic events would have to rise.

The ASUO provides only seven per cent of the Athletic Department budget. For that reason, Wyatt said that he would like to "work toward a formula that would be essentially a subscription of tickets each year, as is done with the Emerald."

The funding plan used in past years was that the ASUO allots a portion of the incidental fees to the Athletic Department on the assumption that a certain amount of money will be made from student ticket sales.

If the ticket sales do not reach the predetermined goal, then the ASUO supplies the difference. Ritchey said the pitfall of this plan is that if one of the athletic teams has a bad season, the ticket sales go down and the ASUO pays for it.

He assured the executive that

season ticket applications will be in registration packets this year in time for pre-registration. The administration prevented similar action last fall, but officials told Ritchey that will not happen again.

Bill Landers, an assistant director, said that deleting the season ticket applications from the registration packets could account for as much as a \$15,000 loss in ticket revenue.

Wyatt said that he felt sure that the State legislature would lower the age of majority this year, and he asked whether the department would approve of selling beer at football games.

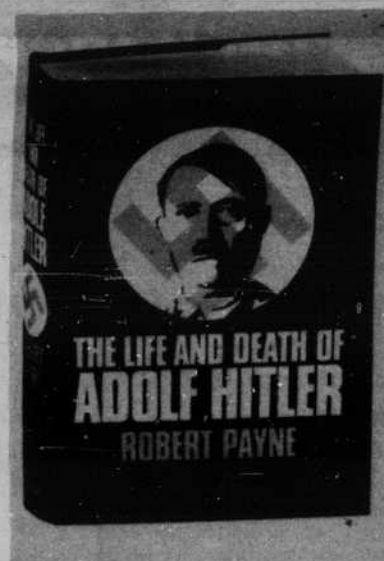
Ritchey said the department is opposed to the use of alcoholic beverages at games because of the problem of crowd control.

Landers added that the people who sneak alcohol into the games now seem to control their actions because "they know they're doing something illegal, but if it's legal, they're less inclined to maintain a posture of control."
