Children's theatre auditions slated

The University Theatre is having auditions for two children's theatre productions, Puss an' Boots and The Tortoise and The Hare from 7 to 10 p.m. today, Wednesday and Thursday in the Pocket Theatre, Villard Hall. Afternoon auditions will be held from 3:30 to 5 p.m. Wednesday. Auditions are open to all persons. All roles will be played by adults.

'Lesbian Women' authors to speak

Phyllis Lyon and Del Martin, the authors of the Lesbian Women and founders of Daughters of Bilitis, the oldest Lesbian organization in America (1955), will be making a number of appearances around the University community today to discuss the oppression they and other Lesbians have encountered as a result of their sexual orientation.

The two women will start off their activities with an informal meeting with the University Feminists and the Gay People's Alliance. The meeting will be open to everyone and will start at 10:45 a.m. The room will be posted in the EMU.

Later tonight at 8 p.m. Lyon and Martin will lecture on their book and the oppression they have encountered as Lesbians. The lecture-discussion will take place in the Dad's Room. No admission will be charged.

At 10 p.m. the two authors will meet with the Gay community at the Wesley Center.

Lyon and Martin have been married for 20 years. As a result of their political oppression, the two women have also had a hand in establishing the Council on Religion and the Homosexual in 1965 in which they are both still actively involved. In addition, they have also helped in organizing the Lesbian Mother's Union.

Earlier this year, Del Martin was elected to the National Organization of Women (NOW). Both women are recognized nationally as spokeswomen for the Gay and Women's Liberation movements.

Abortion discussion date moved

The Feminists discussion on abortion has been postponed until next Tuesday at 8 p.m. because of the Del Martin and Phyllis Lyon talk on the Lesbian Women. At 10:45 a.m. there will be a discussion between Martin and Lyon with interested feminists on campus.

Experimental city discussed

Representatives of Arcosanti, a self-teaching experimental community in north central Arizona will be in the main lobby of Lawrence Hall all day today and Wednesday to discuss the project.

Constructed by students in architecture, engineering, planning and related fields under the guidance of the Cosanti Foundation-instructors, the city was opened to visitors last spring. The community proper occupies a ten-acre site surrounded by four square miles for park and recreational development.

Funds for the project were provided to the non-profit urban research organization through tuition fees paid by the students, endowments by private foundations, and a dollar-for-dollar government matching funds.

Just Call Me Squirt, a contemporary musical group, will be the featured artists of the Fishbowl Follies this week. They will perform in the EMU Fishbowl on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 8:30 p.m.

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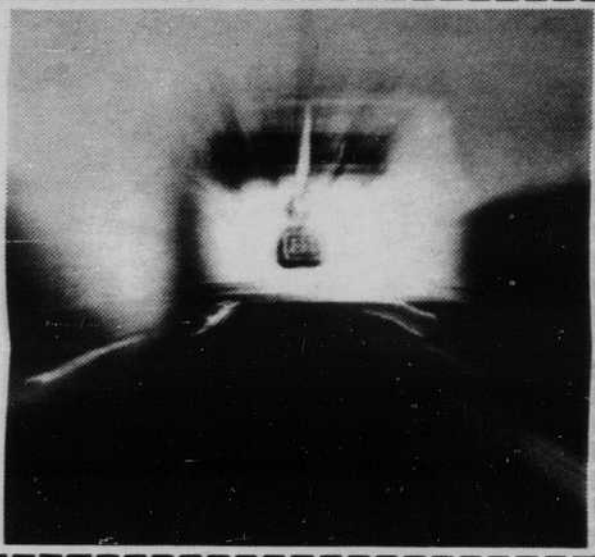

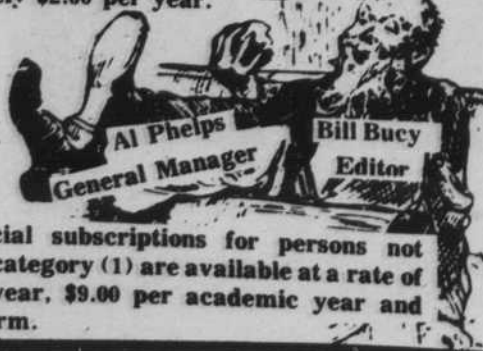
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Subscription rates:
