

# Registration questionnaire aimed toward better advising

Think back to a few days ago when you were registering for spring term. Do you remember some questions on your packet which asked if your major was in the health sciences, secondary education or "other"? The questions were on all of the 15,000-plus registration forms and many students couldn't figure out why.

Every term the office uses that area of the

packet to get special kinds of information, "quickly and easily," he said.

The Registrar's Office uses it, as it has in the past, "as an attempt to improve the student classification system as well as student advising," he added.

This particular questionnaire was aimed at those students who have, as Carlson put it, "a dual objective."

Students cannot declare as a major, pre-medicine or secondary education — they have to go through another department and the University has often lost sight of their "professional objectives" in the past, explained Carlson.

By knowing what students' final objectives are, despite their current major, the office can provide advisers or faculty committees to deal with these students, he added.

J.F. Fitzgerald, vice president of the First National Bank of Oregon in Eugene, has accepted the chairmanship of the Eugene Business-Giving Program for the University Development Fund.

A leader in the community, Fitzgerald serves on the advisory board of the Bureau of Land Management, the advisory board of the Lane County Catholic Charities, as a board member and treasurer of the Lane Family YMCA, and on the finance committee of St. Paul's Church.

He is a member of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, of the Lane County Chamber of Commerce, the Eugene Lions Club, the Eugene County Club, and of the American Institute of Banking.

A graduate of Pacific Coast Banking School, he is a past president of the Portland chapter of the American Institute of Banking, of the S.W. Oregon Personnel Managers, and of the North Willamette Bankers Association.

The Business-Giving program he will head is designed to promote better understanding of the University in the business community and to seek financial support from the business and general community for the University Development Fund.

Gifts to the Development Fund, a private corporation which gives financial assistance to students and provides support for academic programs for which state funds are inadequate or nonexistent, are tax deductible.

### Casanova to chair

Leonard Casanova has accepted the national chairer of the University's annual Alumni Fund, according to a joint announcement by Thomas Autzen, president of the Board of Directors of the University Development Fund, and Thomas Wrightson, president of the University Alumni Association.

Casanova came to the University in 1952 as head football coach. He held that position until 1967 when he was appointed Athletic Director. He was named Associate Director of University Relations in 1970 and retired in 1972 and went into private business.
