Fee committee hears Emerald request

Is the Oregon Daily Emerald worth 1½ cents a copy?

That was one of the questions brought before the incidental fee committee in another session of budget hearings Monday night. Emerald General Manager Al Phelps and members of the Emerald staff were on hand to present a budget calling for \$44,700 in student incidental fees, or about \$2.98 per student per year. The budget represents a substantial increase. This year's budget totals \$26,400, or about 1 cent a copy.

"We're looking at how we can really give students more what they want," said Phelps in describing the reasons for the increase. Editor Bill Bucy pointed out that anything that would bring in more money to the paper would result in a bigger paper, with more space for news and more jobs for student writers.

Phelps said production costs per page run about \$28. He also cited an increase of more than a thousand pages a year from the total two years ago.

"I think the scope is broadening quite a bit," said Torrie McAllister, Campus News Editor.

One of the goals the Emerald wants to achieve with a larger budget, according to Bucy, is a printing service for minority groups' newsletters. Bucy contended that this could be done at a cost less than half of what the groups would have to pay a printer in town.

The Grower's Market submitted a request for funding to help buy supplies for a new building that they hope to erect this summer. Sharon Mainzer described the workings of the market in its attempts to offer low food prices in exchange for the work required to obtain the food from wholesale distributors. About a third of the 400 households who participate in the market are student households, according to Mainzer.

The group is self-sufficient, but would like the funding in order to construct a multi-purpose community center, one that would

make space available at little or no cost for dances, benefits, movies or meetings, she said.

Art Barfield presented a Black Graduate Student Council budget totaling \$2100. The organization was allocated only \$500 for this year. Barfield said, "in order to make the group a viable organization, it cannot remain a one-man organization." Much of the increase will go for additional salaried positions. One of the group's main problems is identity—Barfield estimated that about 1.6 per cent of the University's graduate students are Black.

Teresa Moreno presented the \$10,800 budget of the Migrant Labor Project, an increase of \$1,446 over this year's budget.

Moreno outlined the two main aims of the program as getting more people outside of the campus Chicano population interested and educations for the children of migrant laborers during the summer. The organization hires 50 people to work an entire summer with the program of education and entertainment for summer migrant workers.

Rafaela Belcher, director of Project Life, a program that gives medical, optical and dental aid to about 30 students, outlined her budget of \$2500. Most of the students come to the program through the High School Equivalency Program (HEP). The budget total for next year is the same as this year's. Most of the discussion centered around half of this year's Project Life budget that remained unspent. Belcher said there was "no incentive" for reduced spending due to the fact that excess money goes into the executive reserve fund.

Tripp Mikich presented an as-yet unincorporated "Community Video Access Center." Mikich asked for \$750 to help pay for video equipment to get the group started. The group plans to provide a center for contracted work, inter-community communications, and access to video equipment for residents of the Eugene-Springfield area.
