Although literacy was once limited to the aristocracy "good minds are not the monopoly of a limited class of people," Wilson said, and with the invention of printing, good minds in all cultures demanded literacy and books.

He will discuss his theory that the patterns and locations of social gatherings are influenced as much by the traditional social life of a community as by the buildings in which the gatherings occur.

The Architecture and Allied Arts faculty will give a luncheon for Ellis at the Faculty Club on April 18, and he will appear at a "brown bag" luncheon colloquium sponsored by the Sociology Department from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. April 19 in 714 PLC.
