

To 40% of cost

Study urges tuition hike

Resident undergraduate and graduate student tuition should be gradually increased to equal 40 per cent of the estimated cost of instruction, says the Foundation for Oregon Research and Education (FORE).

This conclusion was made in FORE's 200-page report, "The University Management and Finance Study" which was released last Thursday in Portland.

The report lists findings and recommendations from the seven subcommittees of FORE's University Finance Committee. That committee is comprised of 36 business and professional

persons, most of them from the Portland area.

The group's subcommittee on funding of higher education concluded that the tuition hike should be "increased incrementally" but that any increase in tuition "should be accompanied by one or more means by which students can finance the additional tuition charges."

The report said current Oregon State System of Higher Education (OSSHE) tuition policies represent "a middle-ground position" relative to community and private colleges in Oregon and that certain inequities are reflected "in the fact that undergraduates pay 26.6 per cent and graduates 24.3 per cent of the cost of instruction on the average."

The report included other recommendations to the OSSHE:

—It said that granting college faculty members tenure was "not an acceptable practice to provide job security." Although the report noted that the three basic reasons for tenure—"to protect academic freedom, to provide job security and to attract and retain talented faculty"—were essential to quality in higher education, it said those reasons "can each be achieved by other and better means than tenure."

—The report suggests that 20 per cent of the existing educational programs be reviewed yearly and those "which do not meet minimal criteria" be terminated. The first programs to be reviewed should be those with low enrollment and few graduates, according to the report.

—FORE recommends admission standards be raised at the University, Oregon State University, Portland State University and Oregon College of Education. It proposed that the now 2.25 grade point average necessary for entrance be raised to 2.5.

He will consult with members of the University Department of Chemistry faculty and present a seminar on ion exchange chromatography at 2:30 p.m. today in 331 Science II.
