Where can Rover run? The City of Eugene has designated four unimproved city park areas where dog owners may exercise their pets off a leash. City ordinances require that dogs be on a leash anywhere else in the city, except the owner's property.

The areas designated include:

- The unimproved section of Amazon Park between 29th and 30th Avenues and the area west of the Amazon drainage canal;
- The unimproved section of Skinner Butte Park on the west side of Owens Rose Garden and the Washington-Jefferson Street Bridge along the Willamette River to North Polk Street;
- The unimproved section of Westmoreland Park from Polk to Fillmore Streets between the tennis courts and Westmoreland Community Center;
- All of Bloomberg Park off East 30th Ave. at the end of Bloomberg Road.

A small flyer with maps of these areas and the pertinent city ordinances is now available at Eugene Parks and Recreation Department in City Hall, the Lane County Dog Control office or the Lane Humane Society.

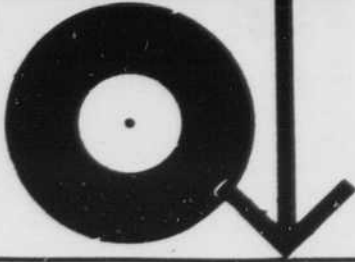
