For Marshall-Fitzpatrick

Looking over the last ten ASUO elections, two Presidents have been charged with election law violations: John Luvaas (64-65) and Kip Morgan (69-70). President Luvaas was charged with three violations of posting campaign materials in unauthorized places and acquitted on election night. The campaign manager for Luvaas's opponent filed charges with the ASUO Senate which stopped Luvaas from taking office for two weeks. These charges were dropped in the interest of justice and disgruntled office seekers united with the

elected leader to aid in the progress of Student Government.

The most interesting case was Kip Morgan's hard fought and very close race in 1969. Several days after the victory, two law students sought to overturn it with a series of nineteen charges: twelve for campaign finances, four campaign poster locations and three for campaigning election day. After the longest trial in ASUO history, sixteen charges were dismissed or dropped and the three remaining charges were termed "not serious." Kip Morgan was able to gain his deserved victory because the elections court understood the basic concept of Justice, i.e. while there were technical violations of the rules, the unity of the Student Community is of overriding importance.

On Wednesday and Thursday students will be faced with a choice between two strains of political thought; on one hand Greg Leo and Debbie Barnett — reasonable, moderate but with only a vague understanding of the political realities now confronting students. The next President will face the most potentially powerful voting area in Oregon but its potential is now restricted by the outmoded ASUO political form. He, with other student leaders, will be responsible for shaping a new form of government to meet the needs of 1973. Through their collective efforts this new form could become a model for others but if the present structure is continued for another year it will die of benign neglect.

The only people who can unify the Student Community and make the changes necessary to insure real governance are DOUGLAS MARSHALL AND CATHY FITZPATRICK.
