incoming freshmen and present project students continuance at this University."

Secondly, they felt that project directors must be able to act as viable advocates for the students they represent and they must possess more administrative and operational power so they can deal directly with those channels that affect their students.

Wyatt and Loveys continued stating: "A selection procedure for directors must be set up with direct and fair representation by students, individual programs must have autonomy to set up and carry out their own recruitment process; and to continue to carry out the special services needed by their students, such as personal counseling and academic counseling." They also added that some type of negotiating committee should be immediately set up to assist the review of the original EOS proposal and formulate a new plan. This committee should include project directors, representative of effected administrators, and project students.

In concluding, they presented a challenge to University President Robert Clark and his administration stating: "the current crisis surrounding this EOS proposal carries a challenge to President Clark and the administration to act responsibly in reviewing their decision."

Bassow to speak on UN at forum

Whitman Bassow, senior public affairs officer for the United Nations Environmental Programme, will meet with representatives of the press, radio and television at a Press Conference at 8:30 a.m. today.

Architect to speak on construction

Portland architect Cynthia Ripley, currently a visiting assistant professor of architecture at the University of Oregon, will give a free public address entitled "Believe It or Not... Women in Construction" on Friday at the University. Her lecture, which is part of a spring series sponsored by the School of Architecture and Allied Arts, will be at 4:30 p.m., in 177 Lawrence Hall. She has worked on architectural projects in London, England; the San Francisco area; and Portland. While studying for her master of architecture degree at the University of California at Berkeley in 1969, she formed a non-profit corporation called Housing Advocates with two other graduate students. She recently has been involved in helping to plan hospital expansion.

Counselor's conference scheduled

Students, faculty and other interested observers have been invited by the Admissions Office to attend a High School and Community College Counselor's conference to be held from 9:30 to noon in the second floor of the EMU today.

High School and Community Counselors from all over the Oregon academic area will be attending the conference to receive feed-back and information from former students of their institutions and other counselors.

Meeting rooms for the conference are 213, 214 and 215 in the EMU. Tables for each high school and community college will be identified.

Science III dedication, open house slated

The public is invited to see the University's new science building at open houses today and Friday during dedication ceremonies for the three-story, \$3.7 million addition to the University science complex.

Hours for the open houses will be 2 to 5 p.m. today and 1:30 to 3 p.m. Friday. Teaching and research laboratories will be open for inspection. Typical classroom work in progress and demonstrations of research projects will be on display.

The public dedication ceremonies are slated for 3:15 p.m., Friday, in the south lobby of Science III, which is located on 13th street, on the southeast corner of the Oregon campus.

University President Robert Clark will present opening remarks, to be followed by the unveiling of a memorial sculpture, "Touching a Wave," wrought by Portland artist Tom Hardy as a representation of the life work of University biologist Paul Risley, a member of the faculty from 1946 until his sudden death in 1971.

The dedication ceremonies will conclude with a public lecture at 4:30 p.m., Friday in 150 Science, by Harvard University biologist Carroll Williams.

Williams, who is chairman of Harvard's subdepartment of cellular and developmental biology, will speak on "Hormones, Genes and Metamorphosis."
