Body and spirit exist and grow

The relationships between the physical world and spiritual world, between the physical body and spiritual body, and between persons dead and living highlighted Tuesday night's lecture by Regis Hanna of Georgetown University.

Hanna's program, "Life in the World Unseen," concerned this interaction of the physical plane with a high-vibration, spiritual plane, which he believes exist side by side. According to Hanna, "Our faith is built and extended according to one's actions. By what you do, you create your spirit."

And the spirit is enclosed within the physical body. "One can't grow without a physical body, and spirit cannot change without vitality from the physical body." By doing things for other people, we gain this vitality, which is necessary before a spiritual awareness can be achieved.

The USSR, unlike the United States, has been doing research for years on the spiritual world, and, with the aid of various instruments and experiments on dying patients, their scientists have measured a form of energy that leaves the physical body when it dies. This energy, Hanna believes, is the spirit. It is the spiritual world we enter through dreams, the world where "people don't know each other's names ... people don't care."

As one becomes more aware of his spiritual plane, Hanna explained, he moves closer to God, and this makes him happy. On the opposite end is depression, which Hanna believes to be Hell on a physical plane, and Hell itself, a dark cold place, void of spiritual light.

Hanna closed his program by reminding his listeners that the people living in today's world are representative of all the people in history who have lived before. The authors of the past are still writing through the authors of today. Beethoven and Schubert still make themselves known through the inspiration of modern music writers. "God needs our help," Hanna emphasized, "to usher in the new age. The world is not the same without your help."

Gillo Pontecorvo (THE BATTLE OF ALGIERS, BURN!) directed this moving study of hope and humiliation in Nazi concentration camps. Susan Strasberg, who stars as 14-year old Edith, won the Best Actress Award at the Mar del Plata Film Festival for her performance. Pontecorvo combines the grim newsreels of Nazi brutality with a tender, lyrical love story in order to achieve the great pathos in this film. In KAPO, the director points out the grisly, unsparing tragedy of war as well as the even greater tragedy of losing the will to fight wars.

Also, A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON MY WAY TO GOLGOTHA, a bold piece of social criticism. The figure of Christ bearing a cross is superimposed over some of the absurdities and tragedies of modern life.
