letter to the Senate Interior Committee, Secretary of the Interior Rogers Morton admitted this to be the biggest problem with the Alaskan route. However, the Canadian route does cross more rivers.

Another reason Dotten favors the Canadian over the Alaskan route is that the most severe oil shortage is in the midwest. A recent letter from Roger Mellem, Northwest Representative of the Sierra Club states that "The markets at Puget Sound, San Francisco and Los Angeles are not large enough to absorb the daily output of the Alaska pipeline - and it is obvious that Japan, in fact will be getting a vast quantity of that oil, since it is cheaper to ship oil to Japan than across country to the Midwest."

The most important reason environmental groups oppose the Alaska route, according to Dotten, is because it involves the use of a seaway from Valdez to Pacific ports, and the likelihood of an oil spill is high. The Canadian government, for both economic reasons and a fear of oil spills off British Columbia, has come out in favor of the alternative Canadian route.

Dotten concluded by saying "One reason I so strongly oppose the Jackson bill is because it will never make Congress squarely face the pipeline issue, and it will never make them face directly the issue of the so-called 'energy crisis' and the determination of national energy priorities."



Toelken, wife named Danforth Associates

A University faculty man and his wife have been named Danforth Associates. They are J. Barre Toelken and his wife Miiko.

Toelken, associate professor of English, has been previously honored by The Danforth Foundation, when they awarded him, in 1972, one of the E. Harris Harbison Awards for Gifted Teaching. The award carried with it a \$10,000 grant.

Earlier Toelken, in 1970, received the University's Ersted Award for Distinguished Teaching. He was featured, in February, 1973, in an article in the Chronicle of Higher Education for his unusual teaching methods.

His specialization in English is folklore, a field in which he is internationally recognized. He was, for a number of years, editor of the Oregon Folklore Bulletin, and is editor of Northwest Folklore. He has recently been named, by the American Folklore Society, as editor of the Journal of American Folklore.

He is also widely known as a balladeer and has appeared on many radio and television programs, as well as in concert at numerous colleges and universities. He has released three albums of folk songs.

Danforth Associates are selected from among college and university faculty members and, with their wives, participate in the Danforth program at their own institutions.

The program is unique in that the Associates work directly with students on a personal basis in an effort to improve student-faculty relations and to strengthen the teaching-learning process.

Each Associate couple receives a stipend and can apply for funds for special projects in keeping with the aims of the program and to sponsor educational conferences.

In August, 1973, Barre and Miiko Toelken will attend a national educational conference in Estes Park, Colorado. The meeting will deal with the improvement of teaching and higher education generally. Associates are eligible to attend annual regional education conferences through their years of affiliation with the Program.

Evening activities include musical concerts, movies, slide lectures, a play at the Carnival Theatre, or a night tour of Eugene.
