Hulteng writes journalism textbook

"The Opinion Function: Editorial and Interpretive Writing for the News Media," a textbook on editorial and interpretive writing for undergraduate and graduate journalism majors, will be published this month by Harper & Row, Publishers.

The author is John Hulteng, professor of journalism at the University and a former editorial writer.

The book focuses on generating ideas and developing editorials that are striking, lucid, and persuasive.

Hulteng is an experienced professional journalist and former editorial page editor of a major metropolitan daily. He has received a Pulitzer Traveling Scholarship from Columbia University and a Nieman Fellowship from Harvard University, as well as a number of other awards and fellowships for outstanding journalism.

Hulteng has been at Oregon since 1955 and served as Dean of the Journalism School for six years.
