South Eugene High School presented nearly \$1800 to White Bird medical clinic and the

BRING recycling center Monday in a short ceremony held at the school.

The student body raised the money through various activities ranging from "haircuts for charity" to slave auctions and a '50's dance.

"We ended up making more than we expected," said student

body president and drive coordinator Dave Spencer. "Last year we only raised \$500."

BRING Coordinator Peter Thurston says the recycling center will use its share of the money to buy a forklift. "We'll be able to handle tons at a time, rather than 500 pounds," said Thurston.

White Bird business manager Luke Carpenter, and Bernie Bailey, also at hand for the presentation, say the clinic will use the money to buy medical clinic supplies and equipment.

A special meeting of the members is hereby called to be held June 1, 1973, at 12:30 o'clock p.m. at room 103 Fenton Hall, University of Oregon campus, Eugene, Oregon for the purpose of discussing the proposed following resolutions:

June 6th Meeting

In addition, a special meeting of the members is hereby called to be held June 6, 1973, at 12:30 o'clock p.m. at room 107 Lawrence Hall, University of Oregon campus, Eugene, Oregon for the purpose of voting on the proposed resolutions. Voting on proposals No. 1 and No. 2 shall be by mail ballot except that a member who has not cast a mail ballot shall be entitled to cast a secret ballot at the June 6, 1973 meeting at which the result of the voting is to be finally determined.

SAMPLE BALLOT

PROPOSAL NO. 1.

The Directors propose to the members that Article VI of the Restated Articles of Incorporation be amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

In the event of dissolution or liquidation of the corporation, the entire assets and liabilities thereof shall be distributed exclusively to a non-profit corporation organized by the Board of Directors, pursuant to ORS Chapter 61, to receive such assets and thereafter to operate the general book and supply store as a nonprofit corporation for the benefit of the students and faculty of the University of Oregon. The Articles of Incorporation of the nonprofit corporation shall provide that in the event of its dissolution or liquidation, its net assets shall be distributed exclusively to the State of Oregon acting by and through its Board of Higher Education for the use and benefit of the University of Oregon for its unrestricted educational purposes.

Article VI in its present form provides that upon dissolution of the Co-Operative the assets would be transferred to the state of Oregon acting through the Board of Higher Education for the use and benefit of the University of Oregon.

PROPOSAL NO. 2:

Upon the condition that Proposal No. 1 receives an affirmative vote of a majority of the votes cast, the Directors propose to the members that the Co-Operative Store be dissolved effective June 30, 1973, and its assets transferred to and its liabilities assumed by a successor nonprofit corporation organized by the Board of Directors pursuant to ORS Chapter 61, to receive such assets, assume such liabilities and thereafter operate the general book and supply store as a nonprofit corporation for the benefit of the students and faculty of the University of Oregon.

Grad student awarded IBM fellowship

Peter Sherman, graduate student in chemistry, has been awarded an IBM Predoctoral Fellowship of \$7,206 including \$2,000 that will be allotted to the department of chemistry as a research grant. Sherman, who has been a graduate student at the University since 1970, will study a theory of the spectra of biopolymers.
