Two models investigate environment

"Environmental Quality and Economic Growth" was the subject of a speech given Tuesday by Emery Castle, dean of the Graduate School at Oregon State University.

Castle explained in detail the work being done at Oregon State under a \$500,000 grant from the Rockefeller Foundation. The program attempts, through the extensive use of social science and interdisciplinary techniques, to investigate what kinds of adjustment man might make when faced with different environmental circumstances.

Castle said he was "disturbed about some of the models that are coming out in this area" that say exactly what man will do when he is confronted by environmental variables. Castle's proposal concentrates more on the different ways man can respond, instead of providing a "doomsday kind of prediction."

According to Castle, the three main objectives of the program are to strengthen the capacity of Oregon State University to deal with environmental quality, to provide interdisciplinary training for a number of graduate students and to provide useful research results for the people of the state of Oregon.

To achieve these goals, two units are in operation. The Willamette Valley Simulation Model studies economic activity, indicators of the quality of life and the availability of natural resources. Particular attention is paid to land and water use, air quality and the distribution of population. These are studied by not only social scientists, but by personnel trained in engineering, biological science and forestry as well. This model hopes to test and evaluate alternative institutional arrangements and incentive systems.

It works closely with the Location Decision Unit. This unit seeks to investigate "the role of industrialization, the production and consumption habits of the given population and their location," according to the proposal submitted to the Rockefeller Foundation. It does not seek to dictate how natural resources should be used, but to show the impact of social institutions on resource use.

This unit works closely with state government officials. Castle believes that state government and agencies can be a "valuable check in problem formation." Working closely with the government will also increase the chances of governmental acceptance of the program conclusions, since the officials have been involved the whole time, Castle said.

Cancer presentation set at LCC

"The Hopeful Side of Cancer," a two-hour presentation on cancer treatment with testimony by cured patients, is the topic for the next session of the "Life, Health and You" Series, scheduled for Tuesday at Lane Community College.
