

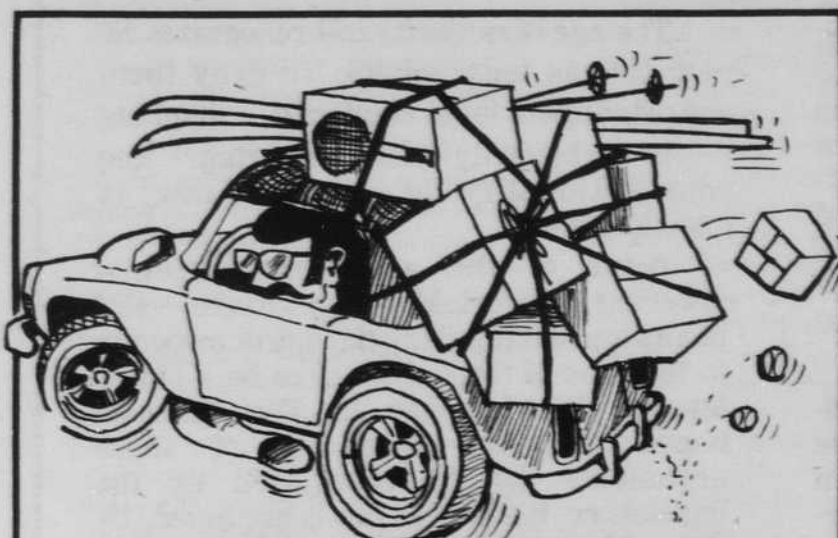

Proxmire to speak to 2,309 graduates June 10; McCall to get award

A graduating class of 2,309 degree candidates will be presented at the University of Oregon's June, 1973 Commencement.

The ceremony will be held Sunday at 2:30 p.m., June 10, in Hayward Field, with U.S. Senator William Proxmire, D-Wisconsin, giving the commencement address.

In three previous graduation convocations held during this academic year, 2,070 students have received baccalaureate and graduate degrees. The University has been holding four commencements yearly since 1963.

The School of Law, for the second year, will hold a separate commencement service. This will be at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 9, at the Law Center Plaza.

Three distinguished Oregon citizens, whose contributions to the state, to education, to culture, and to humanity have been outstanding, will receive the University's highest recognition, the Distinguished Service Awards, at the June 10 Commencement.

The three to be honored are: Governor Tom Lawson McCall, a 1936 Oregon journalism graduate, who has provided leadership in reorganizing Oregon's government to move into the

21st Century; Elizabeth Waechter, whose determination and devotion built the area's first school for retarded children; and Chandler Beall, whose development and publication of the nation's first journal of humanistic studies is a major contribution to American education and culture.

Recipients of the 1973 Distinguished Service Awards were selected by a student-faculty committee from nominations made by faculty, staff, students, alumni and members of the public sector. The criteria for selection is that recipients must be persons "who by their knowledge and skills have made a significant contribution to the cultural development of Oregon or society as a whole."

Pre or post-commencement social gatherings will be held by a number of departments, schools and colleges. These will allow students, faculty and parents to meet informally.

Concurrent with the commencement for the Class of 1973, will be the reunions for older classes. Alumni Weekend, June 8-10, will feature reunions of the 50-year Class of 1923, the 25-year Class of 1948, and the Half Century Club.

A breakfast, a brunch and several receptions are being planned as informal get-togethers for members of the June, 1973 graduation class, their parents, friends and faculty.

The events are to be held both before and after the Commencement; all but one of the parties will be on Sunday.

The first event is a 9 a.m. Saturday, June 9 open house and reception in the Law School.

Pre-commencement parties will be held by the College of Education and the School of Librarianship for their graduates. Education graduates will attend an 11:30 a.m. breakfast in the Clinical Services Building. A 12:30 p.m. brunch will be held for Librarianship graduates in the Library Staff Room.

Following graduation, receptions will be held in Lawrence Hall by the School of Architecture and Allied Arts, in Commonwealth Hall for College of Business Administration graduates, in the Browsing Room of the Erb Memorial Union for graduates of the Wallace School of Community Service and Public Affairs, in Gerlinger Hall for those in the College of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. School of Journalism graduates will have their reception in Allen Hall, graduates of the Music School will meet in the Music School amphitheatre, and the College of Liberal Arts is holding a general reception for all graduates on the lawn south of the EMU.

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
