Court to hear case for Kent State suit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court Monday agreed to decide whether Ohio officials are subject to federal damage suits in connection with deaths and injuries of Kent State University students in May, 1970.

The Court will hear arguments on the issue next fall or winter in a case brought by the families of three of the four students killed when National Guardsmen opened fire on a crowd of students demonstrating against the movement of U.S. troops into Cambodia.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled on Nov. 17, 1972 that the suit could not be brought.

The suit invoked the Civil Rights Act of 1871, which provides for legal action against any one who by virtue of state law deprives another person of rights secured by the U.S. Constitution.

District Judge James Connell of Cleveland dismissed the suit on the basis of the 9th Amendment, which forbids suits by individuals against states. He said the suit was really one aimed at Ohio as a state, although various individuals, including then Governor James Rhodes and former University President Robert White, were named as defendants.

The 6th Circuit, upholding Connell, said that "executive immunity" from suit extends to the named individuals, including officers of the guard. The lower court refused to involve itself in the "political questions" of whether the guardsmen were properly trained.

"We ought not to limit the governor in the exercise of his discretion to call out the National Guard to suppress a riot or insurrection; neither should we tell the military not to carry loaded weapons to protect the troops when someone may shoot or throw rocks at them," the opinion said.

Term enrollment stays at last year's level

A total of 6,239 students had enrolled in the University's 1973 Summer Session by 5 p.m., Friday, June 22, the final day to pay fees without penalty.

The figure is roughly the same as last summer's enrollment on the same date, which was 6,253.

Some 7200 students are expected to take classes at the University this summer, according to Al West, Summer Session coordinator. West notes that this projected total includes persons enrolling for workshops throughout the summer, as well as those in regular classes.

Grad to head Black studies at Washington

Trevor Chandler, formerly with the University, has been named director of Black studies at the University of Washington.

Chandler earned masters and doctoral degrees in political science from the University in 1968 and 1970, respectively. While at the University, he coordinated a tutorial program for disadvantaged students and taught Black studies in the Wallace School of Community Service and Public Affairs.

A native of Trinidad, he obtained a bachelors degree from California Polytechnic Institute.

Chandler joined the University of Washington faculty in September, 1970, and has been acting director of Black studies during the past academic year.

University staff member, wife publish book

A University staff member and his wife, Nick and Elske Jankowski, have just published a book on Oregon bicycle trips.

"55 Oregon Bicycle Trips" is the title of the book, published this month by Touchstone Press of Beaverton. The focus is on bike routes in the Willamette Valley and along the Oregon coast, from Lane County to the northern Oregon border.

Each tour is covered by a two-page spread which includes a summary of the tour, an elevation graph, a written description, a map, and photographs taken along the route.

Jankowski has been publications editor for the Special Education Instructional Materials Center at the University for two years. He is also a masters candidate in journalism. Elske Jankowski taught kindergarten this past year at Edison Elementary School in Eugene.
