

Schmidt takes EWEB post

Policy making will be the prime concern of Calvin Schmidt, recently elected commissioner-at-large to the Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB).

The Commissioner's main interest in serving EWEB is to offer his extensive background of experience to help serve the citizens of the Eugene area, Schmidt said in a recent interview.

Schmidt feels EWEB has provided "good planning to

maintain a healthy economic atmosphere for the community." Schmidt said EWEB is continuing to do a good job.

Schmidt says he approves of EWEB's investigation of methods to solve solid waste disposal problems. According to Schmidt, the government is developing as many as seven or eight alternative means of handling waste materials. EWEB is actively investigating these solid waste disposal approaches, Schmidt says, and the options are being considered in terms of their applicability for this particular community.

EWEB is also examining various power source alternatives. Schmidt says a power alternative recommendation by EWEB will most certainly involve both public and private resources. The best interests of the community will be the basis for determining which power source option is to be recommended.

Schmidt says he feels a strong obligation to contribute to his community by serving as an active commissioner on EWEB.

Residential burning ban in effect

The Lane Regional Air Pollution Authority announced a ban on residential open burning which took effect Sunday and will end October 30 of this year.

The ban prohibits the burning of any type of domestic rubbish, tree or yard trimmings by Lane County residents living on the Willamette Valley floor.

The ban is observed annually during the official field burning season so as not to overload the at-

mosphere with particulate pollutants that may cause severe health hazards to citizens of Lane County.

Normally, all commercial, governmental and industrial rubbish open burning is banned on a year-round basis. No open burning is allowed at any time within the Eugene City limits.

GPA to hold vigil Tuesday

The Eugene Gay People's Alliance will hold a short vigil Tuesday at noon on the EMU Terrace in memory of the 29 people burned to death in a New Orleans gay bar June 24.

Fire broke out suddenly in the upstairs bar, quickly engulfing the second floor of the building. New Orleans police suspect arson but the fire is still under investigation.

A report in Thursday's Emerald that the Incidental Fee Committee (IFC) upheld ASUO President Greg Leo's veto of a \$10,000 salaried position for the Gay People's Alliance (GPA) is incorrect. The GPA's budget request did not exceed \$2,000 and didn't include a salaried position, according to IFC member Randy Shilts.

The IFC approved the GPA budget after cutting \$100 from the original request. Leo had recommended a \$500 cut when he vetoed the GPA budget, Shilts said.

Librarian fellowships to be offered

The University School of Librarianship, in cooperation with Lane Community College, is offering a 1973-74 fellowship program for training five beginning librarians to work in the vocational, general, and remedial efforts of community colleges.

Beginning with the 1973 fall term, the five fellowship awardees will pursue a course of study in the UO School of Librarianship and College of Education in the fundamentals of librarianship, community college programs and education of the disadvantaged.

Their studies will include a 120-hour internship at LCC, which has facilities for serving the needs of the disadvantaged through its technical-vocational and basic education curriculum and through its new multi-media Learning Resource Center.

To be eligible for the fellowships, candidates must be accepted in the program leading to the Master of Library Science degree at the University's School of Librarianship. Each fellowship carries full tuition and fees and a 12-month stipend of \$3,000 with allowances for dependents.

Lane Transit buses to serve Westmoreland

Beginning today, the Lane Transit District will provide express service between the Westmoreland housing project and the University.

Morning buses will leave Westmoreland Recreation Hall, 16th Way and Garfield Pl., at 8:15 a.m., 9:15 a.m., 10:15 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. Although the bus will stop for University passengers along the way, its route will follow 13th Avenue, bypassing the downtown transfer point, and arrive at the corner of 13th Ave. and Kincaid St. in just 10 minutes.

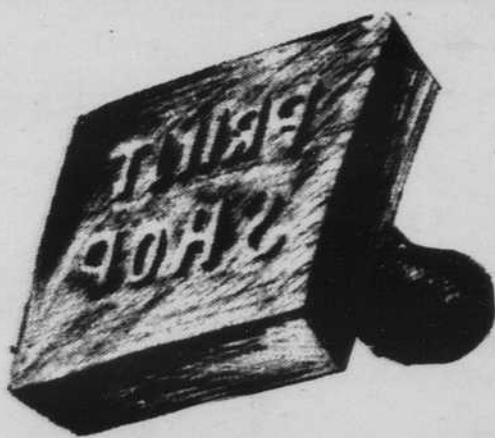

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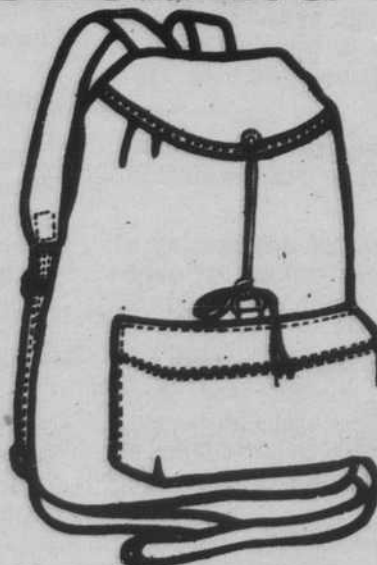
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
