### Resource Center acquires collection

The Environmental Resource Center has acquired a unique collection of books, periodicals, pamphlets and newspaper clippings covering a wide range of environmental topics. The Center is located in 11 PLC and its new summer hours are:

Monday, 9:30-11 a.m.; Tuesday, 9:30-11 a.m., 1 p.m.-3 p.m., 7-9 p.m.; Wednesday, 9:30-11 a.m., 1 p.m.-3 p.m.; Thursday, 9:30-11 a.m., 2:30-5:30 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m.-1 p.m.

Besides library collections, the Environmental Studies Center contains directories, an expertise file, degree program information, curriculum guides, bibliographies, internship programs, research material, and more.

The Environmental Studies Center was established to coordinate information and activities pertaining to environmental problems and their solutions. The Center hopes to bring together students, faculty, officials, professionals and local citizens to merge their previously scattered concerns and talents into a new force for environmental improvement. The Center intends to provide the means to cross traditional boundaries, to stimulate and aid the intensive investigations necessary for change, and to encourage the diverse communications required to effect such change.

### Degree applications due by July 6

The list of all degree candidates for summer term graduation is now being compiled by the Office of the Registrar. The last day upon which an application for degree can be filed for inclusion in this list is July 6, 1973. This date will be enforced because of the many operations of checking, clearing and printing which must follow.

To qualify for the degree applied for, a student must have completed all necessary work and procedures by the end of the term. All transcripts from other schools, including Division of Continuing Education, necessary for a degree should be sent to the attention of Graduation, Office of the Registrar, in order that it be on file by the Deadline, September 7.

Any student who has applied previously and did not receive the degree must reapply.

### Chinese Studies awards announced

Roger Hong Scholarships in Chinese Studies have been awarded to three University students enrolled in intensive Chinese language courses this summer. The recipients are: Karen Sheperd, a freshman majoring in Chinese; Frank Dufay, a freshman in Asian Studies; and Janis Hunter, a sophomore in Chinese. The scholarships are sponsored by Roger Hong, a Portland businessman, who studied Chinese with Professor Angela Palandri while a student at the University.

### Grants available for Vacation College

Ten grants are available for University alumni to attend Vacation College, a Danish-styled educational experience which begins August 12.

Each of the anonymous grants will enable one person to attend the week-long session for only \$40 or a married couple for \$80. The cost, regularly \$150 for a single person and \$280 for a couple, covers all expenses: tuition, room and board, and entertainment.

Vacation College, now in its tenth year at the University, offers the stimulating atmosphere of a small boarding college where students and teachers have close association with each other.

Two courses of study are offered this year: "Freedom and Authority" and "Scientism and Humanism." The session is August 12-19.

Participants are housed in the College Inn, within walking distance of the downtown mall as well as the campus. Private rooms with baths are furnished.

Deadline for applications for the alumni grants is July 18. A couple is eligible even if only one is a graduate of the University. This is the first year the grants have been available.

### National board reviews bond project

A new research project at the University to devise ways by which local governments can sell their bonds at lower interest rates received its first review last week by the project's advisory board.

The project has been funded for \$233,000 by the National Science Foundation, according to George Kaufman, who is a John Rogers professor of banking in the College of Business Administration and one of the principal investigators in the project.

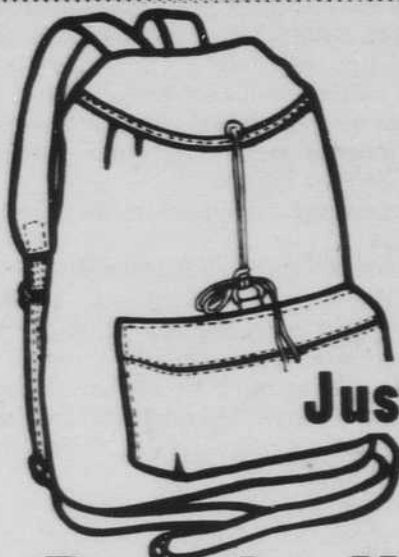
Co-principal investigator is Michael Hopewell, assistant professor of finance. Other faculty involved are Richard West of the College of Business Administration and Gerald Bierwag and Myron Grove of the economics faculty.

Doctoral students taking part in the project are Bruce Kebbekus, David Kidwell, Earl Benson, Robert Rogowski, Arthur Schwartz, and Frank Tam.

Kaufman noted that the board's functions are to make sure the research has practical applications and to provide a channel for two-way communications with potential users of the research findings.

The research project is housed in the Center for Capital Market Research in the College of Business Administration.

It has been funded from June 1, 1973 to September 30, 1975.
