

Development, crime are biggest fears in Lane Co.

Lane County government should concentrate on matters involving criminal prosecution, planning for county growth and development and consumer

protection, according to questionnaire results discussed Wednesday at the County Commissioners meeting.

The survey was conducted by Ann Ranta, a U of O student, on field placement at Lane County last spring and Bob Swank, research assistant for Lane Council of governments. Twenty five per cent, 638 people, responded to the May questionnaire.

In addition to the three top priorities, a majority per cent respondents felt the county should place great emphasis on the solid waste (garbage) management system, road maintenance, preventive

medical services traffic safety and environmental sanitation control of sewage disposal.

The respondents also indicated that county resources should in the future be involved in improvement of the solid waste management system to meet state and federal environmental standards (77 per cent yes), encouraging industrial and business development which is planned and environmentally acceptable (66 per cent yes), increased provision of social services (49 per cent yes), improvement of present jail facilities (46 per cent yes) and development of a library system serving all Lane County residents.

County seeking planning member

The Lane County Board of Commissioners is seeking an interested person to serve on the Lane County Planning Commission. The vacancy is created by the resignation of realtor Ralph Fulbright.

While the makeup of the Planning Commission has normally included a realtor or property developer, the Commissioners have indicated that they are undecided whether this policy will be continued.

Current makeup of the Commission fulfills residence requirements, so Commissioners are free to select a resident from anywhere within the Lane County Planning Commission district except those coastal residents within the jurisdiction of the Western Lane Planning Commission. The dividing line is generally the eastern boundary of the Mapleton School District (or the crest of the Coast Range).

Members of the Planning Commission serve for a three-year term with a limit of two terms. Persons interested in serving on the Commission should write to the Board of County Commissioners, Lane County Courthouse, Eugene, Oregon 97401.

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
