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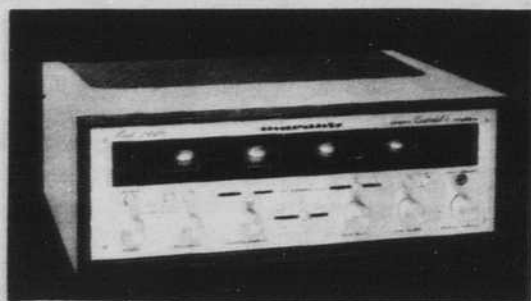

**District attorney adds
Environmental
Protection Division**

Lane County District Attorney Pat Horton has announced the creation of an Environmental Protection Division within his office. Heading the new division will be Shelley Smith, a recent graduate of the University's Law School. Smith has an extensive background in environmental law and will be assisted by law students working in the district attorney's office.

Lane County is the first district attorney's office to make such a move in the state of Oregon.

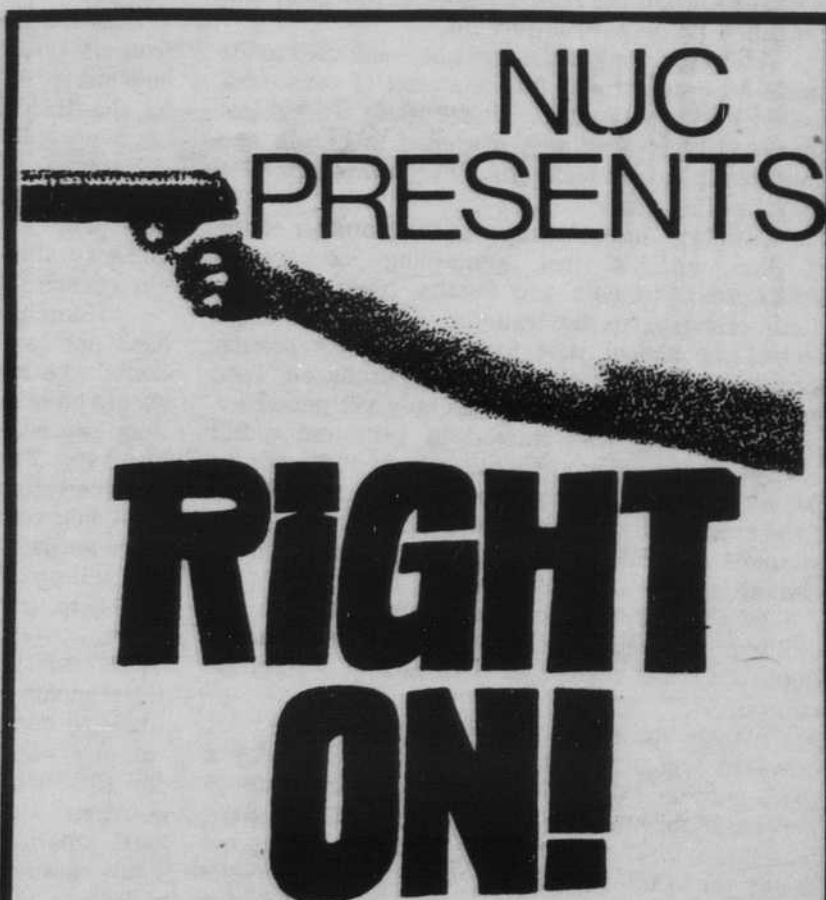
Horton commented that "traditionally, district attorneys have ignored environmental laws, leaving these problems to the State Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)." Horton said that the DEQ has specific jurisdictions and powers and he feels the entry of the district attorney's office into this area is important "since those who pollute our air, water and land in violation of the law are just as much criminals as those who create a public nuisance by destroying property and causing harm to others."

Horton emphasized that the district attorney's office will "work hand-in-hand with the DEQ as well as the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)." Horton said that the personnel of the DEQ and EPA were particularly trained and qualified to investigate possible violations of environmental law and that "the efficient enforcement of environmental protection laws requires the combined talents of county, state and federal authorities."

The new division will handle both complaints from citizens and support civil sanctions issued by other agencies. "This area of the law is constantly being revised," said Horton, "Thus enforcement is often difficult and complex, and initiative and determination on the part of public officials is demanded."

Horton also commented that there exist on the books laws which provide both civil and criminal sanctions for persons convicted of violating environmental laws. He pointed to the public nuisance statute, which allows persons violating provisions of the water pollution laws to be prosecuted under public nuisance laws in addition to the original offense. The statutes set out penalties for air, water and land pollution which range up to one year in jail.

Horton said that he hopes to see his office assist as the prosecuting arm of the statutes and "help insure the right of the public to a clean and healthy environment."
