Alternatives being planned for land use

"We are in a period of transition now between the old and the new," stated Lew Manhart, of the Willamette National Forest planning staff. He was addressing members of the Sierra Club at their luncheon meeting Tuesday.

Throughout his presentation, Manhart stressed the need for public response to land use alternatives planned for the Willamette National Forest. He was outlining a new process being implemented by the Forest Service to determine how specific areas will be used.

Under this new plan, the national forest will be divided into eight sections, or "units." Manhart explained that the boundaries for each of these areas were determined according to various environmental criteria including the amount and type of use a particular region receives. A unit plan which will include all possible alternative uses for the area will then be presented for public response. Manhart expressed optimism concerning the fact that the Forest Service will finally be forced to present its policies and objectives in the form of a written statement. "We will then be able to demonstrate to the public the total costs and benefits of a particular plan," he said.

"We are relying almost exclusively on written reports submitted by individuals familiar with a particular area," he said, emphasizing the need for communication between the public and the planning staff.

Child poison education program available

Over a half a million children will swallow some kind of poison in the next year throughout the nation, most of them five years of age or younger.

Oregon last year recorded over 2,200 accidental poisonings in this age group. In Lane County 20 to 25 poisonings are occurring monthly.

To assist in a child's education of poison products the Health Education Section of the Department of Community Health & Social Services is presenting poison demonstrations. The poison demonstration consists of a film, a group of poison products and a discussion with the children on poisons.

The presentations are being scheduled from Oct. 15 through Dec. 14 for interested groups.

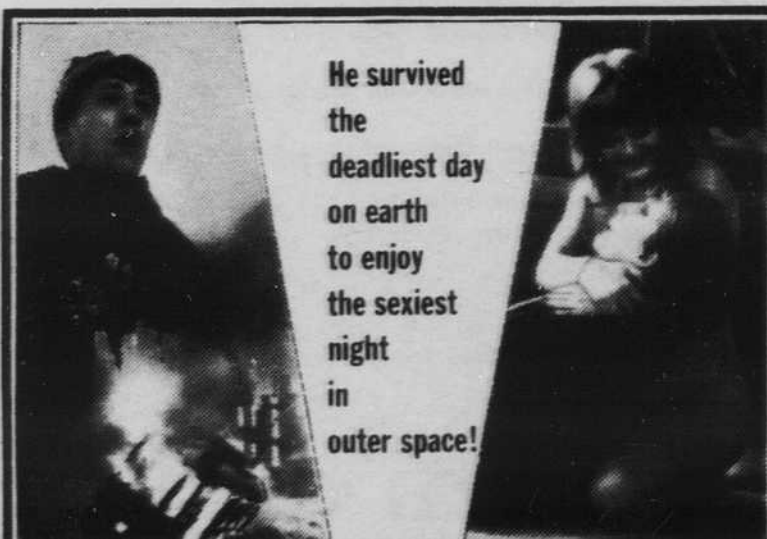
