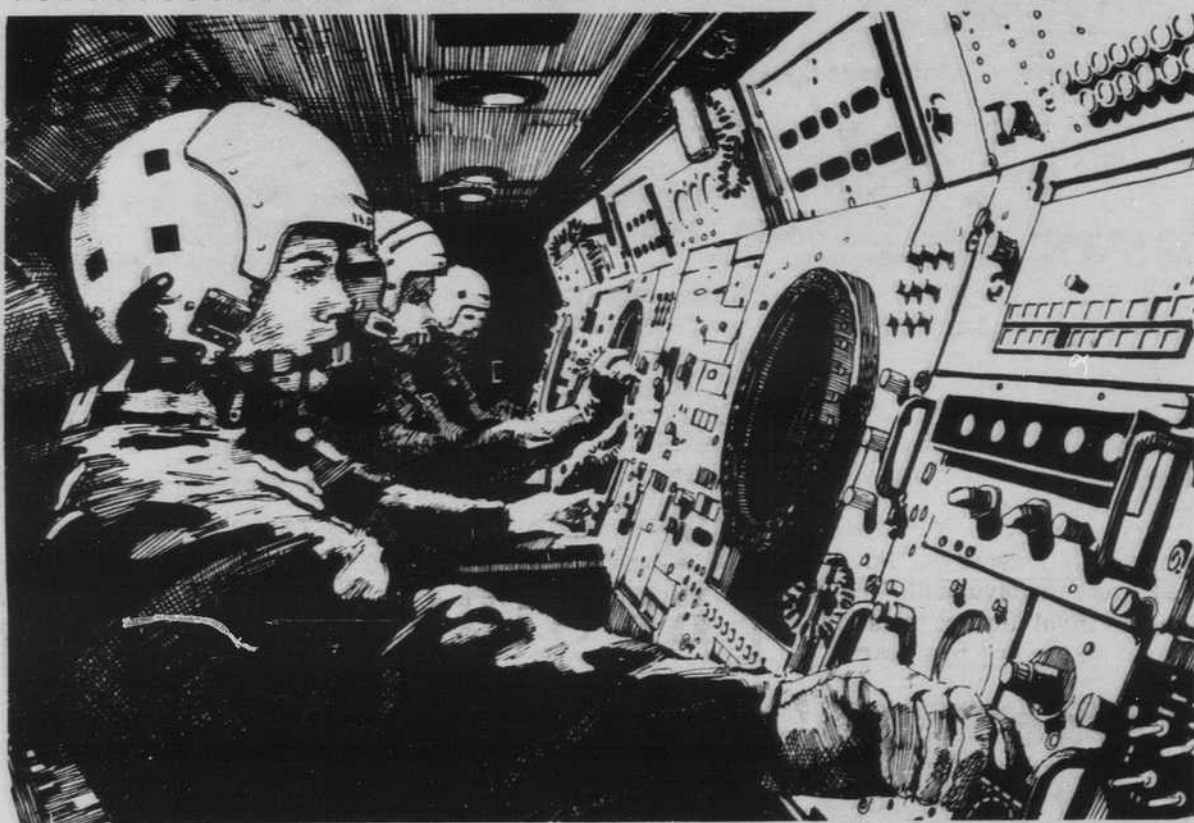

Demonstration organization meeting tonight

Persons interested in helping organize a demonstration Nov. 17 concerning the 200,000 "political prisoners" in South Vietnam can attend a meeting of the Eugene Peace Action Committee at 8 p.m. today in the EMU.

"A demonstration now can stop aid to Thieu's regime, help free the political prisoners, and put enough pressure on the government so that the U.S. never again militarily intervenes in Indo-China," states a leaflet by the committee.

Middle East program set for 7:30 p.m.

A program of film, poetry, theater and speakers on the Middle East war will be presented at 7:30 p.m. today in the EMU, sponsored by the Eugene Coalition Liberation Support Movement, the Third World Coalition, the Organization of Arab Students, and the Iranian Student Association.

A film called "Revolution Until Victory" will open the program, and at 8:15 the program will turn to poetry and a guerilla theater presentation. The program will conclude with speakers and discussion.

Local food stamp center now in operation

The food stamp certification center for students, located at the Wesley Center at 1236 Kincaid St., is in operation and any University student who feels he or she may qualify can fill out an application from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays at the center.

Certifiers from the Lane County Welfare Division will be present to give interviews after applicants have submitted the required information, including rent receipts and check stubs.
