Community planning effort begins

The Center for Environmental Research of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts is beginning a study of alternative methods of controlling development in the area between the University and downtown. The project grew out of several meetings between the city planning staff and a group of interested persons. The objective of the initial research on this issue is to 1) put together a list of resources and information on the area; 2) to coordinate and act as a communications center for University research ongoing in this area (funded, unfunded, classroom, etc.); 3) to develop a proposal for further research directed toward solving this problem. We hope to get a broadly based interdisciplinary effort going that would really be effective at promoting a good environment for people who live in this area. A special subcommittee of the Campus Planning Committee will be working with this project. We will be using a class in the Architecture Department (Research Methods, ARCH 411G) as the initial study group with John Meadows, a graduate student research assistant, and Jerry Finrow, as co-project directors. Our hope is to prepare a joint grant application with the city to fund a long range project. The work this term will deal with two main questions: what is the area like now (research group on: who lives there and what do they think of the area now, the nature of the physical place, who owns property in the area, and what are current modes of development) and what alternative methods of development control are possible (research groups on: testing through design simulation, and collecting information on plus inventing new methods of control with emphasis on the possible application of a pattern language based system). We would very much like to get in touch with classes or individuals who have done or are carrying out research in this area, especially in political science and sociology. Ski Patrol swap next weekend

The Santiam and Willamette Pass Ski Patrols will hold their fourth annual ski swap, Oct. 26, 27 and 28 in the agriculture building at the Lane County Fair Grounds. Items will be accepted for consignment Thursday, Oct. 25, 6 to 9 p.m. and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday. Sale hours are from 6 to 10 p.m., Friday, Oct. 26; Saturday, 27, 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday Oct. 28, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. There is a 10 cent per item consignment fee with 15 percent of the sale price going to the patrols to be used for the purchase of necessary first aid materials and supplies, such as rescue sleds, splints and oxygen, or to replace and update older worn-out equipment.

Free University has openings
