

## 'Publish or Perish' subject of historian

Professor Robert Darnton of Princeton University will be a guest lecturer at the University Thursday, Oct. 25, under the sponsorship of the Department of History.

Prof. Darnton's public talk on

"Publishing or Perishing in 18th Century France: A Case Study" will be at 3:30 p.m. in the Erb Memorial Union. The room will be posted.

A former Rhodes Scholar and Junior Fellow at Harvard

University, Darnton holds the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Oxford University, England.

During the current academic year he is a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Palo Alto, Calif. He has been on the history faculty at Princeton since 1966.

Prof. Darnton's field of specialization is 18th century France, specifically on interrelationships among writers, publishers, and the public.
