

Telegraph bums after President fires Cox

Public reaction to President Nixon's latest actions has produced five times the normal activity on Western Union wires, a company spokesman said.

"This is the heaviest response we've had since Truman recalled Douglas McArthur," he continued.

The responses center around the President's dismissal of Watergate Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox and Deputy Attorney General William French Smith on Saturday.

Former President Harry Truman sparked the earlier controversy when he recalled Gen. McArthur from command in Korea in 1951.

'Tombs of Argos' slide lecture slated

The public is invited to a free slide lecture by Professor Paul Courbin of the Ecole des Hautes Etudes in Paris, tonight at 8 p.m. in 107, Lawrence Hall.

Courbin's appearance is sponsored by the Eugene Society of the Archaeological Institute of America (AIA). He was chosen to be this year's Norton Lecturer, and honorary title awarded once a year to an outstanding foreign scholar.

Courbin is the first lecturer this year in the AIA's local public lecture series.

"Tombs of Argos" will be his lecture topic.

Argos is a city in southern Greece that has been inhabited continuously since at least the Early Bronze Age and probably before 2500 B.C. Its early history is noteworthy partly because Argos was the most important center of the Argolid plain for the so-called Geometric style pottery. During a battle in the 5th century, the women of Argos, rallied by the Poetess Telesilla, managed to repel Spartan attackers.

The Committee to Impeach Nixon will also be circulating petitions throughout the community, and has requested help from persons interested in assisting with this project. In addition, the committee will be circulating pamphlets and leaflets. Another meeting is scheduled for Wednesday night at 7:30 p.m. in the committee headquarters.

In a related development, the Lane County Labor Council is expected to vote at its regular monthly meeting tonight on a resolution, co-sponsored by the Lane-Coos-Curry-Douglas Counties Building Trades Council, to impeach Nixon. Irvin Fletcher, secretary-treasurer of the Labor Council, told the Emerald he expects the resolution to pass. The meeting is closed to the public.

If the Labor Council's resolution passes, Fletcher has agreed to read it to the public at the Saturday rally.
