Professor to speak on views of origins

Dr. Donald Chittick, professor of physical chemistry at George Fox College, will speak on "Alternate Views of Origins" today at 7:30 p.m. at the Erb Memorial Union.

Chittick will speak briefly on the scientific basis for the special creation theory, and answer questions on competing views of earth's formation and history. Also, a filmstrip entitled "Fossils, Strata, and Evolution" will be shown, presenting a critique of the overthrust explanation for fossil sequence discrepancies.

A display of creationist literature will be included, designed especially for school teachers interested in presenting alternatives to evolution in the classroom.

Art History teacher leads local group

A. Dean McKenzie, associate professor of art history at the University, has been elected president for 1973-74 of the Eugene Society of the Archaeological Institute of American (AIA).

The AIA is a national organization which seeks to bring the public into closer touch with ancient civilizations in all parts of the world. Membership is open to professional archaeologists, art historians and amateurs.

Other newly-elected local officers are C. Bennett Pascal, associate professor of classics at the University, vice president; Mrs. Frances S. Newsom, art librarian emerita at the University treasurer; and Robert McClain, language arts department, Eugene School District 4-J, secretary.

The local chapter of AIA sponsors three public lectures annually and a variety of archaeological exhibits and activities.

Psychologist writes book on biology

A University psychologist, Daniel P. Kimble, is the author of a new textbook, "Psychology Is A Biological Science", published this fall by Goodyear, Pacific Palisades, Calif.

Kimble explains that the volume, which he wrote for use in his own sophomore-level course in physiological psychology, combines the psychological and biological approaches.

He is a professor of psychology at the University who has been on campus since 1963.

Future programs include "Talk is Cheap: What Price Am I Paying?" on Nov. 1 and "Parents, Peers and Pressures" on Nov. 8.

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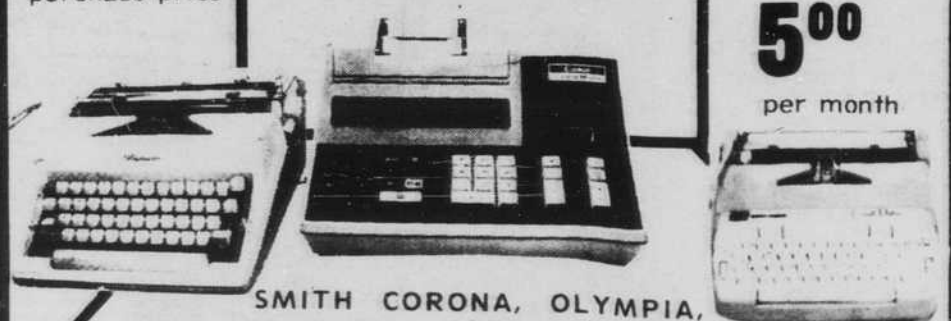
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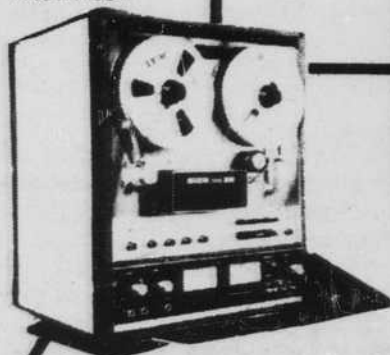


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
