Nelson also claims the group may be playing up to the Incidental Fee Committee in an attempt to gain supplementary funds in the near future. The IFC is currently in a constitutional committee fight with Leo to decide who will control the power through which the Incidental Fee funds are allocated.

The group also disagrees with Leo's upholding of a "money oriented patronage" to the AD and believes that priorities set down by the Leo executive are not in line with basic student needs.

Leo and Nelson want to hold a public hearing for all interested parties through which the ASUO executive could iron out differences and answer questions which are causing problems for unhappy students.

"You can't serve everyone," says Leo, "but we can try. Instead of causing trouble or disrupting the student government we should be getting together, rolling up our sleeves and getting some constructive work done."
