LaCrosse club edges UW

The Oregon LaCrosse club used only 55 seconds of sudden death overtime to edge the Washington Huskies 9-8 Saturday at Autzen Stadium following the Ducks 58-0 shellacking of Washington in football.

Carl Burns shot the winning goal for the Ducks, his second goal of the game. Two others also scored two goals apiece for Oregon. Steve Katz and Keith Ross each put in a pair of scores.

Oregon, ahead 8-6 late in the fourth quarter, saw their victory seemingly slip away as the Huskies rebounded with two quick goals, the final tying goal with only 30 seconds left in the game.

Burns, however, clinched the win with his game-ending sudden death score. The battle was an exhibition match and no other LaCrosse matches will be held this term unless another Washington exhibition match can be scheduled.

Soccer

Lewis and Clark turned its soccer match with the Ducks completely around with two second half goals to gain a 2-2 tie last Saturday.

With 12 minutes gone in the first half, Rick Turi hit Chuck Ennis with a pass for Oregon's first goal. Ennis later scored on a Rick Woodling pass to give Oregon a 2-0 halftime lead.

Lewis and Clark's two second half goals comprised the only second half scoring, as the Ducks were shut out.

After three games the Ducks are 1-1-1 in the Oregon Inter-scholastic Soccer League. Sunday the team is at home for a match with SOC at 1 p.m. on the field south of Hayward Field.

Fencing

The U of O fencing team split into two squads and garnered second and fourth places in the three-weapon Greco Invitational with Willamette University last Saturday. Willamette took first and third positions. The battle for first place was close, decided by one touch.

In individual foil competition among 36 participants from the University of Portland, Willamette and Oregon State, Oregon's Pat Mason finished in second place and teammate Roger O'Connor third.

Thursday the University bowling team goes to Salem for a match with Longview Community College.

Rugby

The annual Oregon-sponsored seven aside Rugby tournament will be Saturday in Portland at 11 a.m. in Delta Park.

Rugby is normally played with 15 players, but during pre-season some teams have fewer players and the teams will cut down to seven for this competition. Sixteen teams from Washington and Oregon will compete.

Inexperience becomes key factor for bowling team this season

Inexperience is going to be the major factor limiting the men's Oregon bowling team from accomplishing what has almost become a tradition — winning the Oregon Collegiate Bowling League.

In the last 22 years, the team has finished at the top of the heap an unbelievable 16 times. Oregon's reputation for fielding one of the nation's finest teams each year is well known, and the man behind it all was Lou Bellissimo.

But Lou is no longer around and neither are four of last year's starting five who led the team to a first place finish in their division last year. The sole survivor of that group is junior letterman Veryl Brovald, the only southpaw in the starting five.

The remaining four spots were filled by two sophomores and two freshmen. The sophomores, Dean Vrooman and Mike LaLumi barely scratched the surface of varsity competition last year and the two freshmen, Bruce Dean from North Bend and

Denny Goodman from Boise, Idaho have never bowled in varsity competition. Enough said about experience.

The first match was held Thursday, Oct. 16 at Portland State and the aforementioned starting five found nothing but trouble. The team was suffering from a lack of depth as returning sophomore lettermen Andrew Kwong and Kent Konradson failed to make the trip. A combination of Portland State knowing how to shoot their lanes, and the

inability of Oregon to adjust resulted in the loss of three out of four games.

Oregon, however, is not suffering from an exceptional lack of talent. All of the top seven have proven themselves with 185 to 195 averages in league competition. But adjusting to the conditions and pressures of a varsity match requires a unique skill. Head coach Mal Fiese is hoping to develop that skill in his youthful team.
