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Recycling expansion discussed

Jeff Detlefsen, political science major and concerned environmentalist, talked about expanding the present campus recycling program at the environmentalist's luncheon Wednesday.

The program began last spring when Detlefsen and a group of concerned students decided to try and recycle some of the garbage coming out of the Hamilton dormitory cafeteria. They managed to eliminate 70 per cent of the garbage coming out of the cafeteria by sorting out and collecting cardboard boxes, bottles, and plastics that were previously hauled away to the dump.

This year, with the help of Search class students who participate as part of a lab session, the program has expanded to include Carson and the EMU cafeterias. Detlefsen thinks however, that the system isn't totally efficient because of inefficiency on the part of the regular cafeteria workers in separating recyclable materials.

Detlefsen believes that the ultimate success of the recycling programs depends in large part on the support of the University administration.

Detlefsen plans to propose to University President Robert Clark that he start a presidential committee on recycling to look into the need for combining and coordinating individual recycling efforts.

Class for operating nurses offered

Oregon's only course designed specifically for training operating room nurses is scheduled to begin next month at Lane Community College (LCC).

The 12-week program, scheduled to begin Nov. 12, will carry 12 hours of credit and will utilize clinical and laboratory facilities at hospitals in Eugene, Springfield and Corvallis and classroom space at LCC. Enrollment is open to registered nurses. Tuition is \$125 including textbooks.

LCC nursing administrator Estelle Singleton said the program is the only one of its kind currently in Oregon and that it was initiated by the Association of Operating Room Nurses to help alleviate a statewide shortage of qualified ORN's. Phyllis Blaine of Sacred Heart Hospital is the instructor. Students can apply for a full tuition scholarship by writing the Willamette Valley Association of Operating Room Nurses. Enrollment is still open.
