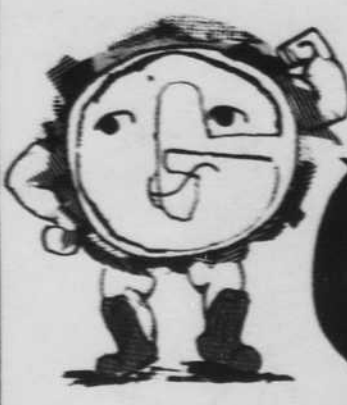

Committees especially important to the SSU are those dealing with undergraduate affairs and staff development.

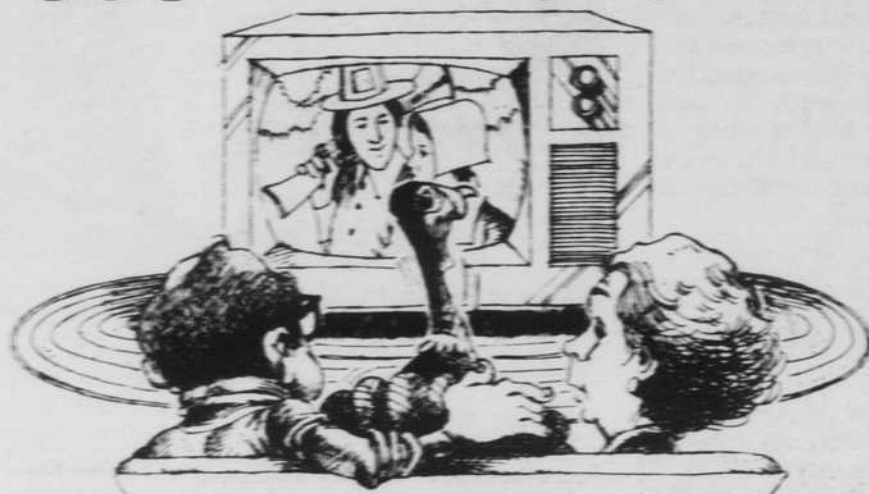

Horton sponsoring drug forum tonight

District Attorney Pat Horton will be joined by Don Menephe, director of pupil services for the Eugene School District, and Marshall Northington of the Lane Mental Health Drug Abuse Committee tonight at 7:30 p.m. for a discussion of drugs in our community and the new marijuana law in particular.

The forum, the first in a series sponsored by the district attorney's office, will be held at Harris Hall in the county plaza. Horton encourages people to attend and said he hoped to make more direct communication possible between the public and his office. The public is encouraged to attend and participate.

Energy crisis topic for American Circus

The energy crisis in Oregon will be discussed tonight by Grattan Kerans on American Circus, a weekly talk show presented by KZEL radio, 96.1 FM. The show will be broadcast from 7-8 p.m.

Guests on the show will include representatives from Northwest Natural Gas Company, Eugene Water and Electric Board, the Eugene Future Power Committee, and the newly appointed State Energy Commission.

Flu vaccine in short supply

Because of a limited supply of a flu vaccine used to combat a virus strain resembling the Hong Kong flu, the Lane County Department of Health and Social Services will only be able to administer shots to those persons with severe chronic diseases.

Lynda Olmsted, clinical supervisor for the flu immunization program, said the department consulted with the American Medical Association to establish priorities after it was learned that the vaccine supply would be limited.

About 1,200 doses of the vaccine known as monovalent will be made available during the regularly scheduled Wednesday clinics during November, Mrs. Olmsted said. However, they will be dispensed only to those patients appearing with a written prescription from their private physician stating that the individual has a severe chronic disease.

Any vaccine remaining after Dec. 1, will be made available to those persons who received their initial flu immunization at the health department.
