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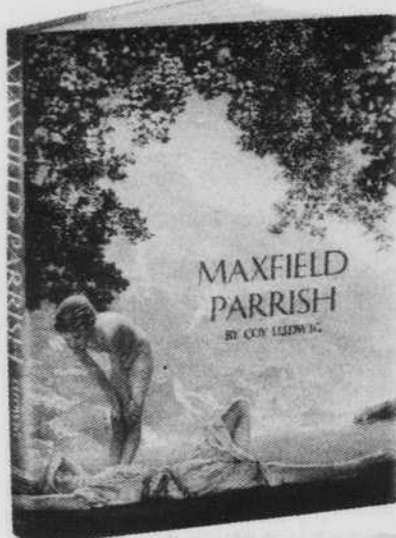

Forest Service has free firewood

If you need firewood you can now get it for free, the Willamette National Forest (WNF) has announced. Effective immediately, the Forest Service will issue free permits for collecting up to ten cords of firewood in the WNF.

The wood may be collected for personal use only, and not for resale.

In past years the Forest Service charged \$5 for a permit to collect ten cords. Because of the energy crisis, a permit fee will not be charged this year.

A firewood collection permit may be obtained by writing, phoning or visiting any of the seven ranger stations in the WNF. Permits will not be issued at WNF's downtown office.

Ranger stations close to Eugene are the Blue River, Lowell, McKenzie, Oakridge and Rigdon stations. Rangers will recommend which areas are good for collecting firewood.

Shoplifting season coming up soon

Theft from automobiles, along with shoplifting and other problems, seem to accompany the Christmas shopping season. The Eugene Police Department would like to issue a warning to Christmas shoppers to be aware that packages placed in plain sight in the seat of an automobile will become the target of thieves. Many thefts in the past were the results of leaving such packages in the car—often with doors unlocked.

Take the trouble to place packages in the trunk of the car even if you intend being away from the automobile only a short time. It takes a thief only a few seconds to get away with the doors unlocked.

Market Research Center established here

A Center for Capital Market Research has been established in the College of Business Administration at the University.

The purpose of the Center, directed by Professor George Kaufman, is to encourage and coordinate research on various aspects of capital markets, financial instruments (including stocks and bonds), and financial institutions.

No direct University funds are used in the research work of the Center. The projects housed within the Center are financed by special grants.

The major research project currently in progress concerns cost savings to state and local governments in the sale of their new bonds. This project is financed by a \$233,000 National Science Foundation grant received in June of this year. A number of smaller projects are also in progress.

Activist priest slates campus visit

Father Jesse Munoz, priest from El Paso, Texas, who has been active with the Farah Strike, will be a guest speaker at the University next Monday. His free public address will be at 7 p.m. in the EMU.

Fr. Munoz will be a guest at the University from Nov. 26 to Dec. 1. His visit is sponsored by the University Cultural Forum in cooperation with MEChA, Chicano (Mexican-American) student union.

During his visit he will make a number of speaking appearances arranged by MEChA. On Tuesday at 8 p.m. he will speak before the Eugene Labor Council at a meeting in the Eugene Hotel. He will meet with MEChA members at 6 p.m. Wednesday in the EMU and at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday will serve mass in Spanish at the Newman Center. His sermon will be in English.
