OSEA slates talk on collective bargaining

Tom Enright, executive secretary of the Oregon State Employees Association (OSEA), will speak about the strengths, weaknesses and general process of collective bargaining, at noon today in the EMU. Enright's talk will be followed by panel questions and general questions from the floor.

Myron Cropsey, a representative from Oregon State University, and a delegation from OSU will also be available to answer questions.

OSEA is attempting to unify all Oregon post-secondary schools into a single bargaining unit. OSEA's efforts were aided by Oregon's 1973 collective bargaining law which brings all public employees under one law, including employees of state agencies, higher education, cities, counties and school districts.
